Mrs. M. E. Selby, long a well known resident of our community, is at last confined to her bed. A peculiar malady attacked her some eight months ago, and in spite of the most careful attendance she has received practically no relief, and there is no hope for her recovery.

A notice in this paper from the health officer, Dr. Miller, orders that all dogs within the village of Farmington be muzzled on and after June 15. The order further reads that all dogs at large after that date without muzzles will be shot by the village marshal. This order follows action taken by the board of health after a meeting held June 10.

There seems to be an epidemic of rabies prevalent throughout this section and the board would be guilty of gross carelessness if they failed to provide the only protection within their power. The restraining of muzzling of the dogs. A cheerful compliance on the part of all owners of the animals should follow.

Some time, probably many years hence, people will come to the conclusion that dogs should have no more liberty, or greater privileges, than other animals. Really there is no reason why they should be allowed to roam the streets and private property at will any more than the cows, sheep and pigs. It's just a matter of custom and one which we will outgrow some day. At present we must submit to the nuisance, and, except when they begin to run mad and inflict hydrophobia on a few people, must put up with their depredations.

Trouble Brewing for Somebody

Forbearance has grown monotonous to the village officials, and some others, and there promises to be some "doings" now that will bring grief to some of the "cute" youngsters of the town and perhaps misgivings to some of the older ones.

The matter of breaking the street lamps had grown so flagrant that it was costing the village \$10 or \$12 a month to replace them. Now the authorities claim to have evidence of the guilty boys and propose to make an example of them. Windows in the churches have also been broken and that is another thing that is going to be settled now.

Another thing that is of even greater importance to the welfare of the community is the detestable practice of selling cigarettes to boys. This is a direct violation of the state law and a greater violation of good order and decency. A large portion of the cigar and tobacco dealers of the country won't sell these destructive things even to men, won't handle them at all, and the practice of selling to young lads is reprehensible in the extreme.

It is claimed that the practice has prevailed here for some time past and the matter was finally laid before County Agent Richard Belt, who came to Farmington a few days ago and, it is alleged, ferreted out those who had been guilty of violating the law in this respect.

It is on this account that it is expected that something will be done that will very likely put a stop to the nefarious practices that have prevailed here for some time past.

"I am glad to say that the great body of soldiers in the sixth district who are eligible under this law, already have their applications on file, and will be the recipients of the same sooner than thousands of others, because their applications will date from the filing at the pension office."

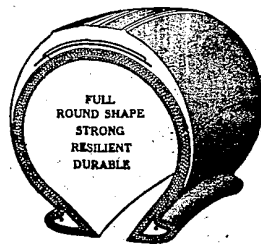
