# Hills planning commissioner seeks 14th District county post

Michael T. Rogers, a Farmington Hills planning commissioner and a transportation planning engineer with the Road Commission for Oakland County, plans to announce his candidacy for the Farmington/Farmington Hills district of the Oakland County Board of Commissioners.

"I am confident that my expertise and involvement in developing strategies and plans to improve the aging infrastructure will be an asset to the county commission and the residents," Rocers said.

The newly redrawn 14th District represents the cities of Farmington and western Farmington Hills. Rogers, 34, holds a bachelor's degree in Construction Engineering from Lawrence Technological University and a master's degree in Civil Engineering from Michigan State University.

This is his first bid for public office, he said. He said he has been active in serving people in metro Detroit and Oakland County for more than 15 years, including the Zoning Board of Appeals, Southeast Michigan Federal Credit Union, Salvation Army, Oakland County Business Roundtable and Van Buren Parks & Recreation Commission. Rogers and he plans to focus on the following issues: roads, water and sewer, holding the line on taxes, increased accountability to residents, and being a voice for the community on issues that can improve the quality of life.

Improving roads will be a major focus, he said, adding that more Oakland County tax dollars need be returned from the state for road improvements. "Ive always been involved in government," he said.
