Start-time forum held tonight

A public forum to discuss the pros and cons of initiating later start times for Farmington's three high schools based on adolescent sleep time research is 7 p.m. tonight (Feb. 28) at the Costick Activities Center, 29800 11 Mile Road in Farmington Hills.

While the district had originally considered a fall 2002 implementation, the change is now targeted for the 2003-2004 school year. A committee charged with examining related concerns is expected to make a recommendation to the school board in April; board members are expected to vote on the

issue in May.

The subcommittees will meet again at 7 p.m. March 4 at the Farmington Training Center, 33000 Thomas Street.

Some supporters say the plan will help teens who get insufficient sleep, which is linked to, among other things, low grades and poor school performance, negative moods such as anger, sadness and fear and increased likelihood of stimulant use, including caffeine and nicotine.

Some public reaction has included concern over costs involved in purchasing additional buses and implementing the plan in light of the district's financial woes.


