

The Money Machine comes unassembled. Simply fold the box together at the top and bottom. Then taps the money together, end-to end. Roll the bills up lossely and place them in the box. Tape the pull-tab to the first bill and thread it through the slot on the top.

"The Money Machine is no different. My goal is to make the Money Machine the standard for giving money for all occasions!"




Awards aren't based on financial need.

Applicants may also request an application online through MRA's Web site at www.retailers.com (the access code is MIRA). Applications must be requested by benefit MRA members and their employees.



High school seniors and college freshmen, sophomores and juniors may apply. Scholarship amounts range from \$500 to \$1,000, depending on the type of college or university attended.



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
