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So how big a factor was each team's defense? The biggest lead either side had was the final score, and that came on a Darnel Wilson layup at the buzzer.



The 6-foot-4 Salem juint tried to work inside early, but when a pass did reach him, three defenders collapsed on him. Hoskins still managed to score 16 points, 10 of these in the second quarter after going scoreless in the first.
