each other, even when we fall behind." Northern played a strong first period, scoring two goals in a 1:47 span in the first period. Senior Mark Paek and Junior Justin Gusko scored quickly to give their team the early lead. Johnson said however, his team never lost faith in sophomore goaltender Jim Blanchard, who made 15 saves in the game.

"We feel confident we have the best goalie in the state, and everyone on the roster feels that way," Johnson said. "He made a couple of mistakes in the first period, so we had to realize that we had to cover for him for a change."

CC's had a habit of scoring goals in the last minute of a period in this playoff run, and this game was no exception. Junior forward Eric Reinhardt picked the pocket of a Northern defenseman and popped in a top-shelf goal while the Shamrocks were shorthanded, to cut the lead to 2-1. Reinhardt's goal came with just 59.7 seconds left in the first period, and seemed to energize his team.

Less than five minutes into the second period, junior forward Brandon Naurato knotted the game 2-2 on a beautiful wrist shot from the right side. The goal clearly gave the Shamrocks new life, as they started to control the play from there. Junior forward Eric Giosa

scored the go-ahead goal 4:43 into the third period when he lifted a shot over a fallen Northern goaltender on a 2-on-1 break. Defenseman Andrew Eggert and forward Bryan Genrich followed with goals 33 seconds apart to blow the game open. Eggert scored on a perfect shot on the short side from the point, and Genrich blasted in a one-timer off a nice pass from sophomore Jeff Prough.

Northern coach Daryl McCarrel gave CC all the credit for coming back in the game the way it did.

"That was a pretty good program we played against," McCarrel said. "They've had some struggles in the playoffs, and have learned how to overcome that to win games. They know the feeling of having to play well when their backs are against the wall, and you could see they had that feeling more than we did."

This game marked the first one-sided contest CC has played in this postseason. After a 4-1 win over Lincoln in the regional opener, the Shamrocks' next three wins came by a total of four goals, including the double-overtime win over Stevenson. Northern had an easier ride through the postseason, its only tough game a 3-0 win over Clarkson in the regional final. The Huskies' other wins came by a combined score of 21-

2. CC junior Patrick Coldren wrapped up the scoring with a power play goal with 4:22 left in the game, ending an outburst of three goals in 1:47. By that point, CC had outshot Northern 13-1 in the third period, compared to a 14-13 shot advantage for the Huskies through two periods.

"Our path to states is hard every year, and Northern is the best team we've played, this year so far," Parkovich said. "We did a very good job at capitalizing on their mistakes."


Marquette, CC's opponent in the finals, blanked East Kentwood 4-0 in the other semifinal game.
