

Many respond to Hills call for firefighters, classes start in April

The Farmington Hills Fire

The Farmington Hills Fire Department received a good response to its request for people willing to be considered for jobs as paid, on-call volunteer fire-fighters.

About 100 people attended an information meeting last month held by the department.

"We had a pretty good duraout," said Fire Chief Rich Mariaucci.

Paid, on-call firefighters are vital to the community, the chief said. "Without them we can't

provide the protection we can."
There are about five paid, oncall firefighters at each fire station, but the department wants
to increase those numbers. Two
weeks ago, 56 of the paid on-call
applicants took an agility test.
"We've been doing interviews,
and we make the choices based
on where people live," the chief
said.

He said it is important each He said it is important each station have a certain number of volunteers and that the people who volunteer live near the sta-tion in order to get to the emer-gency equipment in time. "If you don't live close, we can't

get you on a truck," he said.

Marinucci said the next step is
to plan a class in middle of April
and complete background checks
on the applicants. Those selected
will start training sometime in

It usually takes about a year to complete all the training, the chief said.

The department pays for all training and offers other benefits such as worker's compensation and supplemental insurance.

The starting pay rate is \$12.66 per hour and step increases lead the top hourly pay to \$18.18.

The class is open to parents of children from pre-school age to high school, and parents need not reside in the Farmington District to participate.

Classes are Mondays April 15, 22, 29, May 6, 13 and 20. Spring Session One is held mornings 930-11 a.m. Spring Session Two is held evenings from 7:30-9 p.m. In-district registration fees are: \$30/single, \$35/couple; out-of-district fees are: \$45/single, \$50/couple.
