fall. Make sure you don't cut the crowns. While you're doing this, remove dried leaves and debris to let the sunshine in.

Remove them gradually so the plants aren't shocked. Be ready with covers if we have a cold spell. This selective pruning and uncovering will immediately make your surroundings more attractive.
