# Maintain joy as your children progress

This the season for kindergarten registration, the time in parents' lives when they begin to feel excitement for their child's new adventures in learning. But for some it can be a time of fear or sadness. Here are some ideas that helped me experience this new transition with joy.

Knowing that God is our Fathermother, I felt confident that even though our children were leaving their mom and dad each day for school, they could never be separated from their Father-Mother God, who is always with them, loving, caring for them, and protecting them. Our children had been learning this at home and Sunday School, which helped them feet confident and safe as they began their new journey and removed any sense of separation anxiety.

Panlms 121:8 says, 'The Lord' shall preserve thy going out and thy coming in from this time forth, and even for evermore.' Also, in Genesis 28:16 we have God's ansurance that, 'I am with thee and will keep thee in all places whither thou goest.' Relying on these ideas gawe me the conviction that our children are safe going to

and from school and while at school. This conviction gave me a sense of peace during this time. Sometimes parents feel and knowing their dear little one will no longer be with them as much. I maintained my joy with the understanding that 'each successive stage of experience unfolds new views of divine goodness and love,' as Mary Baker Eddy says in Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures. and that our children would be homesick. We visited the camp before the session started, and we talked with our children about them always being at home in God. We told them that He is the Father-Mother of all of us and provides us with whatever fathering anh methering qualities we need wherever we are. And, of course, we wrote to them often.
