If there remains any doubt about her athletic versatility, the 17-year-old plays varsity volloyball, and competed for a number of years as a softball player in the North Farmington/West Bloomfield League.

"Her competitive juices started flowing when she was two years old," said Stephanie's dad, Kirk, a former NFWB commissioner.

Noxt year, Stephanie will take her myriad, all-star skills to East Lansing, After graduanting from Mercy, she will go to Michigan Stato University and join the Spartans field hockey team.
