## Lure of America 'Short Sweet Dream' can turn sour

The Short Sweet Dream of Eduardo Gutierrez (Crown, 213 pages, \$22) by Jimmy Breslin.

The real-life namesake of Jimmy Breslin's book The Short Sweet Dream of Eduardo Guiterare is no different from most of the young men and women from Mexico who find their way across the border to the United States, assuming the tag of illegal immigrant in exchange for the promise of the American dollar.

En masse they spill into various American cities, where they hope to find "the Job" that pays them well — \$4 to \$6 an hour is considered high wages and allows them to send money home to support their families. In time, the wish is that their fami-

lies will join them in the United States, where the American dream will be played out when they own their own businesses or homes.

"The young of San Matias lived their lives with pictures of American money in their heads," Brealin writes about the people of Gutierres's hometown.

Too often, the reality for the immigrants becomes low-paying, dangerous jobs that they are forced to take simply to make ends meet for only themselves. For Gutierres, this reality led is death. his death

On Nov. 23, 1999, Gutierrez, On Nov. 23, 1999, Gutterrez, 21, was working on the third floor of a building under con-struction in the Williamsburg section of New York's borough of Brooklyn when it collapsed and sent him falling face first into

liquid concrete. He died from suffocation.

This is Brestin's jumping-our point to examine the hypocrisies and illegalities that surround many of the illegal immigrants and the people who get them into the United States and

employ them. He begins in Mexico, detailing He begins in Mexico, detailing the lura American money has for many of that country's poor and how they save their peaces to make the voyage to claim some of that money for thomselves. "Coyotes," men who smuggle immigrants across the border, can charge upward of \$1,500 a person and there is no guarantee

America pushes many to contin-ue trying despite the possible

ue trying despite the possible consequences.

Once the immigrants have reached America, Bresilin's book takes on a more authoritative tone. Gutierrez finds his way to New York, where he shares a cramped apartment with several other illegal immigrants. The fear of deportation keeps them inside except when they work, and their free time is spent either solemnly drinking togeth-

er or finding temporary compan-ionship with one of the prosti-tutes who frequent the neighbor-

hood. Breslin has been a New York Breslin has been a New York newspaper columnist for more than 40 years and his deep understanding of the political landscape gives weight to his criticism that it privately fosters the idea of immigrant labor while publicly denouncing it.

The owner of the building in which Gutterrez died is Eugene Ostreicher, a Hassidie Jew whom Breslin feels exploits the illegal immigrants in the name of profit.

His payroll is \$5,000 a week. If

the workers were legitimate, it would be \$15,000.

Ostroicher also cuts corners when it comes to safety. Breelin writes, and a backlogged city building inspection agency simply has no time to monitor the building properly.

And the immigrants, who every day must line up on street corners hoping to be picked to work, don't complain about the unsafe conditions for fear of not getting work or, worso, being deported.

The result is what Breslin's book is about: a tragedy that is sad, preventable and, without a doubt, American.


