Judge holds off ruling on SWOCC suit

The verdict is still out on
whether a judge agrees with a
local cable access user's claim
that his free speech rights are
being violated by SWOCC.
Todd Levitt, who hosts his
The Todd L. Levitt' show on the
Southwestern Oakland County
Cable Commission, is asking a

judge to consider the cable authority's rules as a violation of his first amendment rights. On Wednesday, Oakland County Circuit Court Judge Deborah Tyner took the summary judgment request by Levitt's attorney under advisement and told the attorney she will issue a written decision. No date was set for the opinion to be delivered, but Levitt's attorney, Stephen

Tyler, said it should be in a few days. Taylor is asking the judge to declare SWOCC's rules and regulations unconstitutional.

to declare SWOCE & rules and regulations unconstitutional. Levitt's talk show pokes fun at lawyers, Taylor said. Levitt was suspended from the studio for two months by the commission for violating a rule that no alcohol is allowed on the studio premises for a wine tasting show he did in 2000.

He later had a disagreement with SWOCC director Caren Collins about broadcasting a show he believed needed to be redone. He has since produced his show at other studies. Collins contends Levitt must follow the same rules as everyone else and that she has based her decisions on operational procedures, not on the content of Levitt's show.


