"It's setting a bar that students need to reach for. When students get close, they change the test," she said.
The test makes students and schools stretch to meet the new standards, she said.
Anible said her biggest problem with the test is the way it's used and that sometimes it is the only measure in evaluating schools.

Watkins said the MEAP tests have validity but that com-

plaints are legitimate.

"We've made it a tool it was never meant to be," Watkins said." It was meant to have local school districts align with state standards. It's been turned into a real estate tool, among other things.

Watkins said when he came to the Department of Education the MEAP was the only basis for accredidation but it now only counts for 67 percent of the evaluation. He said some things can't be measured by the tests.

"I was in Macomb County in Fraser on Tuesday and in Grand Rapids on Wednesday." I saw children singing and dancing and how is that measured by MEAP," he said. "Some students told me that if it wasn't for the singing and dancing, they wouldn't even be in school."

Watkins also questioned the Merit Scholarships that the state awards for high perfor-mance on the MEAP tests.

He said that the state puts a lot of emphasis on the MEAP tests. But state schools use the MEAP tests. But state schools use the MEAP. The business community has embraced the MEAP tests, but they do not hire based on MEAP results.

Many factors prevent some school districts from meeting state curriculum standards and students from reaching expected goals.

goals.

"Analysis shows that the size of your house is a better indica-

tor of how well you'll do on the MEAPs," Watkins soid. "The fact is that there are inequities in the state. The old snying is I've been rich, I've been poor and rich is a lat botter."

Watkins said that economic inequities, inadequate and aging school buildings and the absence of technology all affect the quality of education.

"The state board has asked how we can lift up all our schools, all our students whether in Birmingham, Brighton, Ply-mouth-Canton or Hamtramek and Detroit," Watkins said. "They need the tools to thrive in the 21st century."
