Mercy's top four players will include seniors Kim Warzyniec, Monica Pilzner and Jackie Shinney.



OCC's Grinnell gets 300th career victory

One day after becoming the winningest coach in Oakland Community College history, softball coach Paul Grinnell chalked up career win No. 300 Friday.

The Lady Raiders trounced visiting Alpena in five innings, 9-1. Grinnell had to wait for his 301st victory, however, since the nightcap was suspended in the bottom of the third with OCC leading, 1-0. Kassy DeSutter went 3-for-3 with two doubles and two RBI to lead the Lady Raiders, who are 5-0 in the MCCAA Eastern Conference and 12-6 overall.
