"Some kids don't necessarily want to play up, but he does," first-year coach Ron Shortt said. "He wants to better himself. He knows he's going to lose some matches, but he wants to play better players. He has a great attitude."
Shortt, who coached varsity volleyball at Harrison for more than 20 years, agreed to fill a coaching need with the tennis team this year.
Seniors David Geiger and Ralph Plumley are back in the Nos. 2 and 4 singles spots, respectively.
Senior Masakazu Taniguchi played No. 2 doubles last year, but he worked on his game and will be in the No. 3 singles position this year.
"All of them have shown poise and experience," Shortt said, adding the Hawks won three of four singles matches in a 4-4 tie Monday with Wallied Lake Central.

Harrison has a veteran No. 1 doubles team in seniors John Kluka and Brandon Lackowski, who had that position last year.
Senior Torsten Oehme, an exchange student from Germany, and senior Takafumi Shibayama, who was Taniguchi's doubles partner last season, are a solid No. 2 team, according to Shortt.
Returning seniors Travis Cook and Bob Pandian will play No. 3 doubles, and the No. 4 team consists of sophomores Aaron Work and Kyle Kashin.
Harrison is 0-1-1 in dual meets, having lost to Milford, 6-2.
"We're hoping to do a little better than last year and looking for individual improvement," Shortt said. "It's a great group of kids."
