MU goes 2-3 in tourney

Well, Sunday was a bit better for Madonna University's softball team — but not much.

The Lady Crusaders had a rough start on Saturday at the University of St. Francis (Joliet, Ill.) Tournament, losing two of three games. McKendree University (Coburn, Ill.) toppled the Lady Crusaders 7-1 in their first game; they rebounded to beat the host Saints 3-1 in their second.

In Madonna's third game Saturday, Grand View College (Des Moines, Iowa) pounded out a 9-5 victory.

On Sunday, the Crusaders started with a 9-0 loss to Iowa Wesleyan. They followed that with a 1-0 victory over St. Francis College (Fort Wayne, Ind.).

The 2-3 tournament run left Madonna with a 14-18 overall record.

In Sunday's 1-0 win over the Cougars, Jenny Tenyer tossed a two-hitter, allowing no walks and striking out five to improve to 5-10. Madonna's only run scored on Mary Warchuck's solo home run in the second inning. Emily Cunningham contributed two hits.

In their loss to Wesleyan Sunday, Madonna's defense let down; the Crusaders committed five errors, leading to five unearned runs. Missy VanDoorn took the loss, giving up four earned runs on 10 hits and three walks, striking out five. Her record is 9-8.

Jamie Bobrowski and Tara Turner led the offense against Wesleyan with two hits and two runs batted in apiece as the Crusaders overcame a 6-0 deficit to tie it at 6-6 going into the bottom of the sixth. However, Wesleyan scored three times in that inning to get the victory.

In Saturday's first game against McKendree, Madonna's only run was knocked in by Warchuck, who had three hits, including two doubles. Autumn Batiyk added two hits. Tenyer was the losing pitcher, allowing seven runs (five earned) on eight hits.

The Crusaders came back to beat St. Francis (Ill.) with a three-run fifth inning. Cunningham had three hits in the game and Arin Fowler contributed two with an RBI. Bobrowski also had a hit and an RBI.

VanDoorn got the pitching victory, giving up one run on six hits and a walk, fanning three.

Grand View bunched eight runs in a three-inning span Saturday to down Madonna, which collected 13 hits in the game. Turner had three of them, with Warchuck, Fowler and Batiyk getting two apiece. Fowler and Batiyk had one RBI each.

Tenyer was the losing pitcher. She gave up five runs (four earned) on eight hits and one walk in five innings.

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
