G.P. North tops Farmington again

It was more than a deja vu experience for Josh Stevo Montgomery and the girls on the Farmington High soccer team Friday.

It was a real-life repeat of an event they would prefer not to have been put through again.

The Falcons knew they had been there, done that, when they lost at Gross Pointe North, 2-0.

Farmington was eliminated from the state tournament last year by the same team, on the same field and by the same score.

The game was scoreless until the Norsemen managed to put a long shot - literally, it was from 36 yards out - into the Falcon net with 39 minutes remaining.

GNP added an insurance goal when one of its forwards beat three defenders and scored with five minutes left in the game.

"In the first half, I thought we outplayed them," Montgomery said. "I thought we were a little better. For the first 20 minutes of the second half, it was a back-and-forth game."

"We just have mental lapses that come up now and then, and they cost us. When you play a good team, you can't do that."

What bothered Montgomery about the second goal was the North player outmaneuvered three of his and was probably trying to cross the ball when it went in the net.

"It's disappointing to play well and have a letdown," he said. "The Norsemen deserved to win because we didn't play for the

full 90 minutes and they did. They stepped up their play.

"The (Farmington) girls played hard. I can't deny that. Ninety percent of the time I was pleased with them. It's the 10 percent that cost us the game."

"That's what we have to work on, eliminating those errors and playing 90 minutes. It's not that the girls didn't work hard and didn't want the win. We can't make mistakes against good teams."

The Falcons are 2-2 overall; the Norsemen, ranked No. 6 in Division II, are 4-1. Farmington is an honorable mention in the Division II rankings.

"Last year we beat them the first time, and they beat us to knock us out of the playoffs," Montgomery said.

"This year I guess we'll have to switch roles; because if we see them again it will be in the (state) semifinals (at Farmington High)."

MERCY 3, DIVINE CHILD 2: Second-half goals by Angie Trudeau and Caitlin Kirk clinched the Catholic League Central Division win Thursday for the host Marlins.

Jessica Greaney scored in the first half for Mercy, which is 2-2 in the division and 2-2 overall.

FARMINGTON 5, HARRISON 0: The Falcons won their second game in a row Wednesday while ending a two-game winning streak by the visiting Hawks.

Julie Goettlicher scored three goals and Joyce Rose two, including a penalty kick. Rose also had an assist, as did Stephanie Arnold, Katie Johnson and

Erica Rose. Freshman goalkeeper Kate Kelly earned her second straight shutout. Farmington outshot Harrison, 18-2.

"We have a good team; we work hard and we're fast," Falcons coach Steve Montgomery said. "We keep teams under a lot of pressure."

"We're doing a good job of possessing the ball and passing it. We're trying to work on our offense. Our defense is pretty sound."

"Molly Judy did an outstanding job at sweeper. Shanna Barkume had a really good game at stopper, and Maggie Vailancourt and Kristen Pettila did a good job getting the ball to our offense."

Erica and Joyce Rose, Erin Derock, Katie Johnson, Amyd, Jackie Andrusiak, Mallory McGee and Libby Bohme also played well, according to Montgomery.

The Falcons, who led 2-0 at halftime, were 2-1 heading into a Friday game at Gross Pointe North. The Hawks are 2-2, 1-2 in the Western Lakes Activities Association.

"Our goals were mostly just good crosses," Montgomery said. "We were working on trying to get the ball to the outside, bringing it up and crossing to the other side of the keeper and having people run on to the ball."

"I thought Harrison played a nice game. It was a good, clean game. Harrison never gave up. The Hawks played hard right to the end."

Farmington won its first game April 13 at Ann Arbor Huron, defeating a unified Ann Arbor team, 1-0.

Erica Rose scored the only goal in the first five minutes with an assist going to Goettlicher, but the Ann Arbor defense got stronger as the game progressed.

"Tonight we were without scoring again the harder and harder Ann Arbor played," Montgomery said. "We started out pretty well but, as the game went on, it got tougher. Ann Arbor kept stepping up its play and putting us under pressure."

"The hardest thing was we couldn't get anything going with the mud. A pass that

might go 20 yards went two.

"I tell the girls, 'Every time you play a game you're being tested by something. You're being tested by the other team, the weather or the field condition. You have to overcome all that, and that's what we did.'"

N. FARMINGTON 1, CHURCHILL 1: A goal in the last quarter of the game Wednesday allowed host Livonia Churchill to gain a WLLA tie with North Farmington.

Following a scoreless first half, Nicole Adena was taken down and injured by a Churchill player, according to North coach Tim Russell. She left the game but later returned to play the fullers up, 1-0.

Adena dribbled the ball from the right wing to just outside the penalty area. She sent two defenders and placed a chip shot just out of the keeper's reach.

North was 20 minutes away from a victory, but Churchill was awarded a free kick just outside the penalty area because of an accidental handball.

The defensive wall was organized out of position, Russell said, allowing a shot by Kyle LaPorte directly on net for an easy score.

"Other than that lack of communication, we controlled much of the second half," Russell said.

Key players for the Raiders besides Adena, who played hurt much of the second half, were Christine Munaco and Maghena Callahan in the midfield and, defensively, Michele Boothroyd, Ashley Lynch and Christine Taylor, according to Russell.

Freshman keeper Bridgette Bears just missed her third straight shutout but preserved the tie with several late saves.

"With starters Lauren Hogan, Jenna Street and Nicole Adena out for long stretches of the game due to illness or injury, a few subs played key roles in filling those gaps," Russell said.

"Brittany Loveland played excellent defense. Adam O'Steen filled in very well at the defensive midfield and forward positions."

The Raiders are 2-0-1 and the Chargers 1-1-1.
