## Portrait of an Academic All-Star

If I were to paint a portrait of an Eccentric Academic All-Star, it would have these features beyond his or her amazing test scores and all-A (or nearly) grade point aver-

She or he would be going into science or engineering, would come from an intact family with one sibling, would run varsity track and/or cross country, and would play a musical instrument.

This is true of many of the record-setting 26 Academic All-Stars you will meet who represent the Class of 2002. They come from the nearly 40 public and private schools in *The Eccentric's* coverage area. It is also a pattern that has emerged over the 18 years that *The Eccentric Newspapers* has been honoring these students.

Of course every group of All-Stars is an original. Although some were still deciding at our press time, it was evident that they were more celectic in the colleges they will attend.

Usually, the University of Michigan, Massachusetts Institute of Technology and Stanford and Harvard universities attract a fairly even number of students.

But this year, perhaps more are committed to U-M and somewhat fewer to the other three schools. Instead, they are attending Michigan Tech (two) and fanning out to Amherst, Wheaton and Bowdoin colleges, Columbia and Yale universities and California Institute of Technology.

Four students among this group have matched perfect grades with perfect scores on the Scholastic Achievement Test (SAT) or the American College Test (ACT). Lusi Fang from Troy High, Matthew Klosen from Rochester Adams and Robert Wilson from Detroit Coun-

try Day all scored 36 on the ACT, while Xiaojue Hu from Troy High scored 1600 on the SAT. That certainly is among the most ever. Last year, for example, there was just one to achieve that mark.


All the Academic All-Stars are, of course, members of their school's chapter of National Honor Society or its equivalent. Most have won major scholarships. Those who are still listed as National Merit Finalists will generally be named winners of either the standard \$2,500 National Merit Scholarship or a college or corporate National Merit Scholarship that generally pays even more. They may not have been notified by our press time. Nominees for Presidential Scholar also had not yet been notified if they had won.

We are, once again, grateful to the committee of high school principals that verifies the grades and test scores and selects the team. Thanks especially to Troy High School principal Dr. Larry Boehms, who chairs the committee. We also are most appreciative that Oakland Community College is sponsoring this special section for a second year.
