

Danielewicz sparks North Farmington victory, 6-2

Winning pitcher Beth Danielewicz had a single, double, triple and RBI Thursday as North Farmington earned a 6-2 softball victory over host Westland John Glenn.

The Raiders are 3-1 in the Lakes Division of the Western Lakes Activities Association and 10-2 overall. The Rockets are 1-4 and 5-11.

Danielewicz went all seven innings, allowing five hits and one walk. She struck out six.

Amy Berke and Ali Goldberg added two hits apiece for the Raiders. Berke had two RBI and Goldberg one. Katie Harris got her first varsity hit, too.

Losing pitcher Ruthann Kieltyka gave up seven hits over seven innings. She did not allow a walk and struck out two.

Glenn tallied the game-winning run in the fourth when Joe Cichowski singled and scored all the way from first on an errant pickoff attempt.

Harrison threatened in the seventh when Kevin Zerbo singled followed by a walk, but a pinch runner was gunned down at third base by Glenn catcher Craig Lewis to end the game.

Lewis also threw out another Harrison base stealer.
