MSU's 'Bobby Baseball' is Big 10's best

Bob Malek's high school baseball career ended on just about
the sweetest note possible. It
looks like history, to an extent,
might be ropeating itself.

- Malek, a 1999 graduate of Red,
fqrd Catholic Central High
School, was recently named tribig Ten Player of the Year for the
2002 season, and could be a highround draft pick in Tuosday's
baseball amateur draft.
Indiana's Kennard Jones and
Minnesota's Luke Appert shared
honors with Malek, marking the
first time three players have
shared the award.

Malek was also named to the
second year in a row, making him
just the second player from MSU
to be named in hock-to-back
years, after Mark Mulder was
named in 1997 and 1998.

Malek, who scored the gamewinning run for the Shamrocks
when they won the 1999 Division
1 state championship, has put
together one of the best offensive
carcers of any player in Spartan
history.

He said he didn't expect to put up the gaudy numbers he has, but knew he was capable of great

knew he was capable of great things. . "When I went in my freshman year, my goal was just to play in half the games, and I ended up playing in 55 of the 66 games we had," said Malek, who resides in Canton. "I was confident I could go in there and contribute, but I didn't expect to do wall right. go in there and commons, condidn't expect to do well right

away."
Getting named to the Freshman All-American Team after the 2000 season was just the beginning. Malek has etched his name ning, Malek has etched his name into MSU's record book after two more terrific seasons. In 2002, he batted .394 and slammed a con-

ference-leading 19 doubles. He set new career records at the school with 239 hist and 162 RBI, in just three seasons. He ranked second in the Big Ten this season with 144 total bases, 60 runs scored and 62 RBI, while ranking third with 80 hits

and fourth with 13 home runs. His offense played a big part in MSU's third-place league finish,

its best in several seasons.

Malek said an improved mental approach to the game, as well as the natural maturation process any 21-year-old goes through

helped him to adjust to the college level of play, and eventually to excel at that level.

"In high school I got worked up more over things," he said. "You have to learn that you can't get too frustrated, because the game of baseball is tough. I learned to look at the blig picture more and take things as they came."

Malek has a baseball player's memory. That means, he can recall sequences in games that make you want to sit back and take yourself back to that sunny day with the green grass and sunshine beaming down from the sky.

He recalls just such a day when talking about the pinnacle of his pre-college career, when CC edged Troy 6-5 in one of the most thrilling state championship through in recent memory.

"I hit a double off the wall, but "Intra double off the wall, but there was a little controversy, because it could have been a home run, but was ruled a ground-rule double," Malek recalled. "We loaded the bases and I ended up coming home on a wild pitch. It was real exciting and just a great way to finish off my career.

That was a great team we had.

"That was a great team we had. Almost everyone went on to play college somewhere, with some sport. Casey Rogowski is now in the White Sox system, and we're all still good friends."

Malek pitched a four-hist shutout in the 1999 state semifinals to get the Shamrocks to the championship game. That game alone was sweet redemption for him, after taking a tough loss in the 1998 semifinals.

Infielders Ty Herriott and Ryan Frieburger, both from OU, hit 273 and .271, respectively.


