debonair, calm, cool and collected."

Newly-appointed Farmington Council Member Mike Harrison seranaded the man he replaced, singing, "We'll have a blue council without you."

There were more serious honors as well. Congressman Joe Knollenberg (R-Bloomfield Hills) who helped Farmington secure \$4.5 million to help fund Farmington's sewer rehabilitation project gave Hartsock a flag that had flown above the Capitol and the first of many proclamations in his honor.

"I have to congratulate somebody who has been in public service for 28 years," Knollenberg said. "You're local and you are there. It really does tax your personal time."

Because Hartsock moved to Farmington Hills when he mar-

ried Carole Basile, he could no longer serve on the Farmington City Council.

That led Farmington Hills Mayor Nancy Bates to quip, "In the John Anhalt frame of thought, we've got one of them, there's four to go. I look forward to seeing you at city hall."

Anhalt has long advocated Farmington and Farmington Hills merging in order to avoid duplication of governmental services. He serves on the Farmington Hills Economic Development Corporation.

Don Gould, maintenance man for the Farmington Department of Public Works, said that when Hartsock first came on council, he fought for better communication.

"During that time there were only three types of communication in Farmington — tele-

graph, telephone and tell (Dick) Tupper," Gould said. He presented a coal patch for Farmington Hills potholes and two tickets to the Civic Theatre in Farmington.

Farmington City Manager Frank Lauhoff felt he isn't good at jokes. "I scare people when I try," Lauhoff said.

Instead, Lauhoff presented a congratulatory letter from Farmington Schools Superintendent Bob Maxfield, who couldn't attend, as well as tributes from elected officials, including President George and Laura Bush.

"During council meetings Bill always had a sense for when somebody was about to embarrass themselves and cause a scene," Lauhoff said. "Bill always had a knack for trying to find a winner on both sides."

The benches are located on the Falcon Plaza, which was con-

structed through the efforts of the Falcon Society. Members of the society installed the furniture during a nine-hour work session in April.

"They had to core through six inches of concrete and dirt in order to anchor the tables and seats permanently," Albrecht said. "Over 400 commemorative bricks have been installed among the 15,000 bricks in the plaza."

Fendt Brick Company donated the bricks. B & A Brickpaving provided the labor intensive installation, she said.

"The handsome landscaping and gardens, provided by Steinkopf Nursery, were planted last summer and fall by the Falcon Society, students and staff to be enjoyed by everyone utilizing

the high school and/or the athletic complex," Albrecht said.

Seniors ate outside on the new benches and two new extra-large picnic tables. Ice cream treats were served during the three lunch hours for all seniors on their last day of classes by Booster Club President Janet Szepo, Albrecht and Principal John Barrett.

The new patio furniture is heavy steel with enameled "Falcon Blue" finishing. The furniture was made possible with \$6,000 donated by several FHS groups.

The senior class symbolically contributed \$2,002. The Falcon Society, Football Backers and Music Patrons also donated. More tables and benches are planned.

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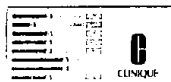
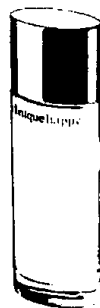


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
