Thompson sentenced to 10-15 years

Convicted pedophile Jim Thompson was sentenced to 10-15 years in prison Friday for violating his probation as a result of Farmington Hills charges of second and fourth degree criminal sexual conduct.

He was extradited from Portland, Ore., in March by the Oakland County Sheriff's Department.

Thompson pled guilty before Oakland County Circuit Court Judge Deborah Tyner earlier this month. She ruled on his sentence Friday.

Thompson pled no contest to the Farmington Hills criminal sexual conduct charges in May 2000. He was sentenced to a year in jail and four years' probation and ordered to stay away from youth under the age 18 unless an adult was present, said Farmington Hills Police Chief William Dwyer.

Farmington Hills Found Similar Obyer.

Thompson violated his probation by disappearing from a private ministry house in Sanilac County in June 2001. He was living there after his release from jail.

Dwyer said he's very pleased Thompson will be behind bars for awhile.

He said Thompson told investigators he had more than 1,200 sexual encounters



with young boys in 35 years.
"We're very pleased he will be put away,"
the chief said, adding when the department
raided his home at the time, there were
hundreds of audio and/or videotapes of his exual encounters with young boys


