Carlson defeated No. 5 Steve Hayden of Birmingham Groves in the second round, 2-6, 6-4, 6-0; Trevor Domlovil of Portage Central in the quarterfinals, 6-4, 6-2; and Trevor Beach of Grand Rapids Forest Hills Northern in the semis, 6-2, 7-6.

Michael Depietro of team champion Bloomfield Hills Lahser stopped Carlson in the final, 6-1, 6-4,

"Dan has worked hard all year and definitely peaked for the tournament," Shenton said. "He has the promise of a very good senior year.

"He went three sets against Groves, but he showed a lot of patience and that's part of being an upper classmen – the ability to fight through a tough match."

Harrison's team of Agim Shabaj, Fermon Tate, Marcus Woods and Terrill Mayberry broke the atute record in that event with a 3:21.1 time, bettering the mark set two years ago by Romulus, 3:22.3.

"It was surren! I couldn't believe we were in the same exact situation," Reed said. "I had to go down to the kids again and tell them, "There's no way you're going to believe me, but we can do this again. But we have to win the mile relay. It's the same scenario; if you want it, it there's for the taking."

Their victory in the 1,600 relay vaulted the Hawks from fourth place with 29 points to first. Harrison
