Ask what he or she would do in your position and whom they know. I'm telling you that there is a neighbor, relative or friend who can direct you to someone who will help you with an appliance question. At one time in this country there were several manufacturers who had toll-free numbers that you could call and get technical help. Today, in this profit-oriented world, many of these same numbers and up charging a fee to your credit card for talking with a service technician.

In the very neighborhood that you live in is an appliance repair company that you can stop in for a learning visit.

You can talk to someone in person, explain what's happening with the washer and get instructions on a few common things that go wrong and you can check out yourself.

For instance, if you complain that the agitator doesn't move back and forth but everything else works OK, then maybe the spline in the top of the agitator is stripped.

The technician will show you how to remove the agitator, hold it up to a light bulb and look inside to find the plastic tech are stripped or worn out.

You can go home, pull the agitator, check it out and buy a new or used one and fix it yourself.
What's wrong with saving \$100 on a service call and isbor? Think of the self-satisfaction you get from doing such a simple thing.
Don't tell me you don't have the confidence to attempt these things, because I've spent a lifetime helping first-time do-it-yourselfers.
There are many hundreds of fixes on appliances that you can do on your own, and most of these shops like to meet new customers like you.
