At age 26, the Canton musician already has earned a degree at the New England Conservatory of Music in Boston, lived and studied abroad—and is now performing under the direction of Neeme Jarvi. 

It's a great method because it teaches kids to use their ears and to learn everything by heart. I didn't learn to read music until about 7. You do it in a group and it's more fun and there are games. To start really young is a bonus. The earlier you start the better because it's harder to eatch up."

By high school, Duitman was 'pretty nerious' about music, forgoing any of her thoughts about becoming an astronaut, doctor or ballerina. In her senior year at the New England Conservatory of Music, life would take a turn though. It was then she met husband-to-be, Zergen Vehage, while per

Filmmaker leaves documentaries for movie made in Michigan

Jim Jahara doesn't seem to mind leaving behind the elephants in Sri Lanka and panthers in Tanzania for the chance to bring a heart-warming story with a message to the screen. The filmmaker's traveled all over the world making documentaries for National Geographic, PBS and the Animal Planet. Now he's back home in Michigan to begin shooting a film about a little boy with cerebral.

Jahara's already put in plenty of leg work scouting locations in Plymouth, Brighton and surrounding areas in order to make the movie tentatively titled Discoury on Blackhird Island after a book by Johnnie Tuitel. Securing rights to the story, writing a script and finding investors are just a few of the tasks needed to lay the groundwork before filming begins in mid-July.


"I think you can make a good film anywhere but

"It's about these kids discovering cuts and dogs



schools and the parents complain about it all the time, and second, that you're a kid whether you have a disnbility or not.

There are 500,000 people with cerebral palsy in the U.S. right now. We wanted to make a family feature film but it's been difficult to find someone with a disability, ages 11 to 14, with acting experience.



"We have someone in mind but we'd still like to find out if there's anyone with a disability with acting experience or a hidden talent to send in an audition tape," said Jabara.

Making this film may be the biggest challenge in Jabara's career so far, one he never envisioned while making videos of his band while a student at while making videos of his band while a student at the old Plymouth High School on Main Street. In fact, it wasn't until after receiving a degree in environmental education 25-years ago that Jabara decided to go into television production. From there it was on to filming The Sloth Bear for international distribution in the series Wild Horizons, Asian Elephanis: Wanted Alive, and Florida Panther, co-produced with Living Planet,
