**City plans 4th of July fireworks** 

■ Officials say it's safer to watch than host your own show and urge parents to be careful even with legal fireworks.

The ovening will begin with a free concert by Stove King and the Dittilies at 7 p.m. The fire-works begin around 10 p.m. and will last about a half hour. 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dors on site. The Farmington Hills Fire Department is asking all residents to celebrate the holiday sufely. Before buying or using fireworks, offi-cials remind residents that the only legal ones in the state are sparklers, flat paper caps, cone fountains that shoot showers of sparks and toy smoke devices, snakes and noise makers. Assistant Fire Chief Pete Baldwin said while

Assistant Fire Chief Fete Bardwin said winks no major injuries or property destruction occurred in the city last year during the holi-day, there was a house that caught on fire because of a bottle rocket years back. And

another time, a bottle rocket ignited bushes in front of a home, Baldwin said. "They're unpredictable," he said of illegal firoworks. "People have a tendency to buy (ille-gal fireworks) out of state and bring them here. Our general rule is if it moves or explodes, they're illegal." He mentioned that even legal fireworks, such as sparklers, can pose a danger to a young child as the sticks can become hot enough to burn skin. "We oncourage people to make sure you uppervise your children closely (when using legal fireworks)." he said. Baldwin said the best thing for families to do its avoid using fireworks altogether and go to thursday. "We'd much rather they come and see the show then put on one of their own," he said.
