Walsh, who had a picture of himself in a Rangers jersey posted on the club website last week, grew up a Detroit Red Wings fan, but he was pleased to be drafted by New York.
"I couldn't be more happy to go to an organization like that," he said. "It's part of the original six and is compared with the great franchises in all of pro sports. Hopefully, it will be a great place to play."
Despite the excitement surrounding the NHL draft, Walsh won't be rushing off to the Big Apple right away. It appears the start of his professionni

Walsh, who has played left wing for the Compiumer Ambassadors at the Junior A Tier II lovel the last two years, plans to attend the University of Notre Dame on a hockey scholarship.

He believes he'll have a chance to play right away for the Fighting Irish, who compete in the Centrall Collegiate Heckey Association with Michigan State and Michigan.

"I'll still have to earn my keep there," Walsh said, adding there are three other forwards in the incoming class at Notro Bame.

"I felt, as far as my game and person, it would help to sit out a year and mature instead of rushing into something.


"For the most part, it takes kids at least two years. There are still kids who are 21 playing in the (North American Hockey Lesgue) trying to get a scholarshy.

They played as a team and different times.


The de-year-old Weingarden spent three years as an assistant at Stevenson under Mike Keller before taking over the varsity squad in 1982.
