Hills native has hand in making movie

Movie making is as a foreign concept for Metro Detroiters as the automotive industry is for Hollywood. is for Hollywood.

Farmington Hills native Tim McArdle witnessed this first hand last summer when he worked as an engineer on the set of the Steven Spielberg thriller, Minority Report, which opened Friday.

They're amazed at how we build cars, and we were amazed at how they make movies, and McArdle, who is a customer service engineer for Kawasaki. "That was my 15 minutes of fame."

minutes of fame. McArdie helped design and build robots for a futuristic auto plant, which served as the backdrop for an action scene and cost \$ 3 millon. The scene, which took more than two weeks to shoot, ended up being about five and a half minutes. It was shot in Vernon, Calif., which is east of Los Angeles. Minority Report is set in the future in Washington, where crimes can be detected by police departments and prevented. McArdle said Cruise was very approachable and that he rented a cappuccino truck

"He was a pretty ordinary guy," McArdle McArdle said Spielberg was easy to talk to

as well.

"He's a pretty down-to-earth guy," he said of the Osenr-winning director.

While working on the set, McArdle and his wife stayed at the Renaissance Hotel on Rodeo Drive in Beverly Hills. For lunch, the workers ate things like crab legs and prime

rib and had a Hawaiian luau with a pig roast

and dancers.

"It's pretty unbelievable," McArdle said. "It almost wasn't like work. It was pretty

Although it might not have seemed like work, the hours were long. He sometimes worked 13-16 hours a day.

McArdle, 33, is a 1987 graduate of North Fermington High School. He has worked as a customer service engineer at the Kawasaki plant in Wixom for three years.

He was also in the Navy for four years. McArdle is a trouble shooter for robots. His work has taken him across the country and to England and Japan.

"We get to travel all over," he said. "It's cool because it's never the same office every day."
