Hebert took home the \$14,500 first prize with 14-under four-round total of 274, including a 70-on the final day of play.

"I got lucky holing the shot, but whenever I am in a bunker I try to make the shot," Hebert said.
"When you just try to get close, you don't seem to deliver. I could see that Steve was a little dejected, but man, he played good."
Polanski, a red-shirt sophomore at Texas Christian University, shot identical 60s for the final two rounds to finish two shots back for a total 12-under 276.
Polanski has been runner-up two years in a row to Hebert a the Michigan Open. He also placed third in 2000.

But he refuses to get down on himself, wowing: "I'll be back her for a lot of years, you can count on that."

"It was fun, I knew coming in what I could do," said Polanski, who was six shots back, but paired with Hebert in the final group. "Scatt played well. It was well deserved."

Polanski, the top amateur four straight years at the Michigan Open, was on the front fringe of the green an No. 17 when Hebert flew his tee shot into the greenside bunker clinging to a one shot lead.

The sawy 33-year-old pro then pulled out the rabbit out of the hat.

"It was kind of heartbreaking."

Polanski said. "But that's the way the ball bounces sometimes. I'll be line."

Polanski shot a pair of 72s the first two days, but climbed his way nearly all the way back.

"I had six bogoys the first day," he said. "It was a more different course than usual. The golf course was wet and I had some bad lies in the rough. I was shitting good shots and making bogoys. I was a little discouraged, but I thought I played four solid rounds.

Polanski, the former state Class A individual medaliat from Stevenson, was coming off the 91st Michigan Amateur the previous week where he reached the round of 18 in match play at Jackson Country Club.

He lost 2-and-1 to Andrew Ruthkoski of Muskegon.

"played five rounds of competitive golf and I was 13-under par," said Polanski, who was the Michigan Amateur runner-up in 1938. "I thought I played well. I had ad line through I played well. 


