Bucks face a 'Menacing' foe

There were more than a few anxious moments for the Mid-Michigan Bucks this season, notably a four-game winless streak that nearly took them out of the playoff picture. It took the victory over the Dayton Gemini in their final game of the regular season for the Bucks to earn a playoff spot. Their reward: a playoff date with the Des Moines (Iowa) Menace, set for 8 p.m. (CDT) Friday in Des Moines.

So what does that mean? Let's look at the task con-

fronting the Bucks, and a daunting one it is. The Menace averaged 3.78 goals a game. They gave up 1.05 goals. Their 69 goals scored led the Premier Development League.

This carried the Menace to a first-place finish in the Heartland Division with a 15-0-3 record — only the third time in PDL history a team has completed the regular season undefeated.

"It doesn't look good, on paper, for us," admitted Bucks' general manager and co-owner James Duggan. "They score more goals than we do and only give up one a game."

"My hope is we can stay disciplined and pull off a 2-1 win or win it overtime."

This wasn't just a case of the normal modesty applied when talking about an upcoming opponent. Nor was it a lack of confidence in his own team. It's just that Des Moines is that good. The Menace feature the top scorer in the PDL in Thomas Holman, who has an astounding 24 goals and 11 assists (59 points) in 18 matches. But this isn't just a one-man show. Stuart Riddle has 14 goals and five assists. Then there's Seth Modhesson with two goals and

10 assists. How offensive is this bunch? Matthew Nickell and Dustin Grau both come off the bench, playing perhaps 20 minutes a match. Grau has five goals and seven assists. Nickell has five goals and five assists.

Such numbers would bolster any coach's confidence. The Menace's Laurie Calloway is no different.

"I've never thought any team in the league could beat us," he said. "I respect our opponents, but I always had confidence we would prevail."

What must figure into the equation is a Bucks' defense that surrendered 36 regular-season goals, an average of two per game and the second-worst total in the six-team Great Lakes Division. The Bucks will also be without marking back Jason Perry, who is out for the playoffs with a knee injury.

Okay, it sounds bad, but all is not doom and gloom for Mid-Michigan. The Bucks were also the second-leading scoring team in the division.

"I'm pretty confident we're going to score two goals every game," said Bucks' player/coach Dario Brose.

The revisions to the Zoning Ordinance include extensive changes throughout the document such as:

- A reorganization of the format.

- Changes to the Zoning Map to reflect the new zoning districts and revised district names.

- Significant revisions to regulations for non-conforming buildings, structures, lots, uses and sites.
- New standards for infill single-family development and site design.
- Refinement of parking regulations, such as changes to the number of required parking spaces.
- Revisions to the landscape regulations.
- Revisions for Board of Zoning Appeals, variance criteria, ordinance administration and ordinance enforcement procedures and standards.

PROPOSAL 02-1

A proposal to amend the provision of the state constitution governing the operation of the State Officers Compensation Commission (SOCC).

The proposed constitutional amendment would:

- Add attorney General and Secretary of State to list of state officials whose salaries and expense allowances are determined by the SOCC. The list currently includes the State Legislature, Governor, Lieutenant Governor and Supreme Court Justices.
- Require the legislature to approve by majority vote any salary and expense allowance determinations proposed by the SOCC before determinations go into effect. Currently, the SOCC's determinations go into effect unless rejected by a 2/3 vote of the legislature.
- Allow legislature to reduce compensation increases proposed by the SOCC.
- Provide that the SOCC's salary and expense determinations would take effect after the next general election.

PROPOSAL 02-2

A proposal to allow certain permanent and endowment funds to be invested as provided by law and interest allowed spending for state parks, local parks and outdoor recreation.

The proposed constitutional amendment would:

- Allow for certain permanent and endowment funds, including Natural Resources Trust Fund, State Parks Endowment Fund and Veterans Trust Fund, to be invested as provided by law, eliminating prior restriction on investing in stocks.
- Increase Natural Resources Trust Fund cap on assets from \$400 million to \$500 million.
- Allow the Natural Resources Trust Fund to continue to annually expend up to 33-1/3% of Fund royalties or other revenues, up to a new asset cap of \$500 million.
- Increase allowed State Parks Endowment Fund spending to include interest and earnings and up to 50% of funds received from Natural Resources Trust Fund.

OAKLAND COUNTY PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION AUTHORITY - PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION MILLAGE RENEWAL

If approved, this proposal will replace the .33 mills levied by the Oakland County Public Transportation Authority in 1998, for the years 1999 through 2001 with .60 mills, for the years 2002 through 2005, and will allow continued support to the Suburban Mobility Authority for Regional Transportation (SMART) for a public transportation system serving the elderly, disabled, and general public of Oakland County.

As a renewal and increase of the mills which expired with the 2001 tax levy, shall the limitation on the amount of taxes imposed on taxable property in the Oakland County Public Transportation Authority area be increased from .33 mills to .60 mills (60 cents per \$1,000 of taxable value) for four (4) years, 2002, 2003, 2004 and 2005, inclusive, for the purpose of providing funds for the support of a public transportation system serving the elderly, disabled, and general public of Oakland County? It is estimated that .60 mills would raise approximately \$17,591,197 when levied in 2002.
