Lori Ward, director of the Northwile DDA, who Richards originally selected, canceled, according to Farmington City Manager Frank Lauhoff.

Bill Richards narrowed the number of candidates from 31 to 10. The one-hour interviews for each of the 10 semi-finalists will be held in one day.

"Can a board member be present during the interviews of the 107" asked DDA Board Member Mark Ziegler.

The interviews in the second phase, before the three-person board committee, will be sometime during the first week in

September, followed by their selection of one or possibly two candidates for presentation before the full DDA board.

If no candidate is selected, the board could go back to the pool of candidates, or can begin the process again.

The intent is to make an offer of employment in mid-September and the tentative start date for the new director is expected to be Cot. 1, Richards said earlier.

Richards has repeatedly recommended this process private until the final candidate is presented to the board though other DDA groups like other DDA groups like Plymouth have held open inter-

Lauhoff said if the DDA board follows the process it set up, which Lauhoff suggested, it will have its three person board committee interviewing the top three people. DDA President Ron Oglesby said he didn't recall this specific process being set up.

Cornwell said Richards strongly supports the process he set up, and she felt it impor-tant for the candidates com-

fort.
"If finalist interviews are conducted by the selection com-mittee, the committee's recom-mended candidate would be referred for consideration of appointment to the board, or if the board prefers, a separate interview with the board prior to consideration of appoint-ment." Richards further wrote.
