■ Pneumococcal disease causes approximately 60,000 cases of invasive disease among people of all ages in the U.S. resulting in 3,300 cases of meningitis; 14 percent of adults hospitalized with invasive dis-

Some of their complications and their complications cause more than 30,000 adult deaths in the U.S. each year. In 2000, influenza and pneumo-nia were the fifth leading caus-es of death among those 65 years of age and older.

The potential for disease outbreaks is high in areas where substantial numbers of under-immunized children and adults reside.

Thickenpox is endemic in the U.S. and virtually all persons who are not vaccinated are at increased risk for contacting chickenpox in adulthood. The risk of complications and death from chickenpox can be as much as 10 to 20 times greater for adults than children.

Dr. Carol Bird, chief of Medical Services at OCHD, says, "Vaccine-preventable diseases unfluent and bed ont distinguish between young and old, rich or poor, racial or cul-

tural heritage. Unvaccinated people of all ages are suscepti-ble to serious debilitating and potentially deadly disease. Vaccines can save lives and reduce the pain and disability of disease."

She was observed changing into a light blue short-sleeve shirt with ruffles and light blue jeans over her black slacks.

Dwyer said the FB1 is taking over the investigation of the suspect in custody because it involves multiple jurisdictions. Police are also looking for two other suspects in recent bank robberies in the area.


