Actually, the Anxiety Disorders Association of America recognized Nicholson's portraval of the obsessive compulsive disorder and awarded him for it at its yearly convention.

### OBSESSIONS

Obsessions are ideas, thoughts, or images in one's mind that are senseless, serve no obvious purpose, and continue even though one may try to ignore them. They are unpleasant and may provoke anxiety guill, and shame.

The most common obsessions are concerns that objects or other people might be contaminated with germs, dirt, or disease. Other obsessive thoughts focus on fears that doors or windows may have been left unlocked or an appliance has been left on, and so forth.

Obsessions can take many forms. They are an excessive preoccupation which cause a person significant distress and take up excessive amounts of time, which amounts of time, which interferes with more effi-cient, day-to-day function-ing. For the obsessive indi-vidual the unpleasant emo-tions associated with their thoughts is way out of pro-portion with any actual risk of danger or harm.

#### COMPULSIONS

Compulsions are repetitive behaviors, sometimes called rituals. Common ones are hand washing, ordering objects in a certain way, checking and rechecking things, and repeating words silently. The goal of compulsions like these is to reduce anxiety associated with the obsessional thoughts behind the compulsion.

For example, individuals with obsessions about being contaminated by germs may reduce their mental distress by washing their hands until their skin is raw. They might wash dozens of times per day.
Typically, they know there is something unusual about this but cannot keep their behaviors in check. Similarly, an individual dis-tressed by obsessional wor-

## Celebrity masks raise money for Hospice of Michigan

The bidding for Hospice of Michigan's Celebrity Mask Silent Auction was anything but silent last

Auction was anything but silent last week.

In fact, the bidding frenzy over General Motors North America Chairman Robert A. Lutz's hand-painted mask was so intense that the auction went live and personal on Aug. 22. In the end, the good-natured, heated contest between Compuware Executive Vice President Denies Knobblock and Dow Automotive Global Vice President of Communications Tim Nasso resulted in Nasso being the ultimate victor. But the real victor of the evening was Hospice of Michigan, the second largest non-profit hospice in the county, which serves more than 900 patients a day in lower Michigan. More than 225 Hospice of Michigan donors and supporters attended the Celebrity Mask strolling cocktail reception, held at the Southfield Thow Center Garden Arthum. The reception was part of the Mask Project 2 Traveling Exhibit, which

began on Memorial Day in Ludington, and continued to Fremont, Big Rapids, Southfield and, now, on to Grand Rapids where the project will culminate at the Masquerade ball on Oct. 26.

Thursday's event netted \$14,000 for Hospice of Michigan, exceeding Hospice's expectations, Lut2's mask went for Nassos's highest bid of the evening, \$3,000.

Armed with a paint kit and white elay mask, entertainers such as Janet Jackson, Kid Rock, the Barenaked Ladies and Cher; community and political leaders, such as former president Gerald Ford; sports figures such as Johnny Bench, Mary Lon Retton and the U.S. Women's National Volleyhald Team; plus other newsmakers, inckled their creations with read. Over the year, the masks have gone on the silent-auction block at the five Hospice of Michigan locations and, beginning on Sept. 10 and running through Oct. 25, you can go online to eflay to bid on many of these masks. Though Lutz said as a kid he used to draw cars all the time, which often dis-
