## CC blasts Rockets in opener

The Redford-Detroit Catholic Central football team started its defense of last year's state cham-pionship in fine fashion, and in the same place where it was won.

The Stammocks encountered little resistance in running their winning streak to eight games with a 44-6 rout of Detroid Crockett Saturday night at the Fontiac Silverdome.

Over the past few years, CC players have become quite comfortable playing in the former home of the Detroit Lious, winning several Prep Bowl and state championships there.

This time, the team opened its season under the Tellon roof, and looked very much like the more comfortable, organized team on the field.

Despite the wide margin of victory — which would have been wider if not for the running clock throughout the final 14 minutes of the game — CC coach Tom Mach said there was plenty of room for improvement for his team after one game.

"I'm not happy with the way we moved the
ball, but we did do a good job of taking advantage of their miscues," he said. "I'd like to see us

In some cases, CC couldn't help but have short touchdown drives, thanks to a number of mis-takes by the Rockets, particularly on special teams.

Twenty-three of CC's 44 points came directly
off mistakes by Crockett's punting unit; a safety
in the first quarter; the subsequent kickoff after
the safety led to a touchdown; an interception the safety led to a touchdown; an interception return for a touchdown, a minus-3 yard punt that led to a short TD drive; and a punt return for a touchdown by senior Kevin McKee. McKee said it was important for the team to get an attacking mentality when other teams make mistakes. Thut's always crucial in a game, to score points off their mistakes, McKee said. 'We've got to put points on the board in any way we can.'

CC's first points of the season came off a botched snap on a punt attempt by the Rockets, making the score a baseball-like 2-0 midway through the first quarter. The snap was fumbled out of the back of the end zone, which is a safely harmals.

The Shamrocks then marched down the field in a classic CC-like drive, spanning 45 yards on nine plays to up the score to 9-0. CC quarterback

David Thomas completed a 23-yard pass to Kyle Smith to set up the score, a one-yard plunge by Darnell Tyson.

Crockett responded with a scoring drive of its own, making it a 9-6 game early in the second quarter. But that would be the last time the Rockets would be within striking distance of the Shamrocks.

A fumbled punt return by the Rockets allowed a CC drive to stay alive, leading to its next score. The recovery gave CC the ball at the 23-yard-line, and a 16-6 lead just three plays later.

McKee finished off the scoring with a 50-yard quarter turn for a touchdown late in the third quarter. He shook off two tacklers, reversed his field and outran the rest of the Rockets on his way to the end zone.

Crockett gathed just 7 total yards in the second half and 68 for the game. Brooks led the
