Konopinski's goal was unassisted. He gained possession of a loose ball in the box and bent a couple defenders to score.

"In the second half, they put a lot of pressure on us the first 15 minutes, and we didn't get back to our game," Farmington coach Luke Juncaj said. "We made some mistakes defensively and gave them chances to

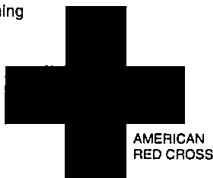
