You can help cat with CRF feel better

Dear Doctors,
My 12-year-old Slamese eat
has been losing weight, drinking a lot of water, urinating a
lot of pale urine, sleeping most
of the time and picking at her
food. She has also been throwing up every other day.
My veterinarian did a lot of
tests and said she is suffering
from chronic kidney failure. Is
there anything I can do to

veterinarian should discuss treatment options with you. If your eat feels very ill and has high levels of waste products (creatinine and urea) in her blood, your veterinarian may suggest that your cat be hospitalized and placed on intravenous Builds. Fluid administration helps reverse dehydration and lower the levels of the blood toxins. You can also supplement your eat's fluid level by injecting fluid under her skin (subcutaneously) at home. When

subcutaneous fluids are administered on a regular basis they help prevent the cre-atinine and urea from building in the bloodstream. You veterinarian can demonstrate the procedure involved.

Cats with renal failure often

Cats with renal failure often don't feel well and therefore have little Interest in food.

Since your cat has a poor appetite, warm the food to make it smell more appealing. You can also make the food more appetizing if you mk! twith low-sodium meat or fish broth or some meat baby food. If all else fails, you can try a prescription or all medication, cyprohepatdine, to help stimulate her appetite. We recommend that animals with chronic renal failure be offered a special diet. Prescription diets for animals with kidney failure are available from your veterinarian. These diets are lower in sodium, protein and phosphorous and may not be as palatable as regular cat food. If your cat doesn't like the prescription diet, offer her a different food. The rule with animals with renal failure is get them to eat whatever you can. It is important that she cat enough calories to keep her from losing additional weight. It is also crucial that your cat drinks plenty of water so she doesn't

erucial that your cat drinks plenty of water so she doesn't become dehydrated.

Sometimes animals with kidney failure have excessively high blood phosphorus levels. Your veterinarian may recommend your cat be given intravenous fluids until the levels return to normal.

If your cat's phosphorus lev-

els are only slightly to moder-ately above normal, your vet-erinarian may simply want you to give her a medication with her meals, such as aluminum hydroxide, to bind the phos-

her meals, such as aluminum bydroxide, to bind the phosphorus.

The phosphorus binder helps keep her phosphorus level from climbing too high. Phosphorus-binding medications are wallable in liquid and tablet form, sold over the counter, and only effective if your cat is eating.

Cats with kidney disease may have subnormal levels of potassium and this may cause weakness. Potassium can be supplemented orally with a tablet, gel or powder. If your cat receives intravenous or subcutaneous fluids, extra potassium can be added to the fluids.

Many cats with renal failure have high blood pressure. Diets high in sodium may raise your cat's blood pressure. Prescription kidney diets are lower in sodium to help keep the blood pressure ormal. If your cat's blood pressure is very high, she may need oral medication to lower her blood pressure. pressure.

AREMIA

If your cat has less energy than usual, she may be anemic. Anemia, which is when your cat has a subnormal number of red blood cells, is relatively common in animals with chronic renal failure. Your veterinarian should monitor your cat's red blood cell count. If the anemia is getting significantly worse, your cat may be given a series of injections of erythropoietin to help her body produce more red blood cells. If your cat is severely amenic, a blood transfusion may be required. You mention that your cat throws up frequently. This may be because her blood ure and creatinine levels are too high and her kidneys can't help rid her body of excess acid. This causes her to feel queasy and may result in the formation of stornach ulcers.

You may relieve her upset stomach if you give her a very dilute liquid suspension of baking soda or an antilistamine, such as famotidine. Most cats don't like the taste of the baking soda solution so we don't recommend it very often. You should discuss any medications with your veterinarian before you administer them to your pet.

A small percentage of cats with kidney failure are candidates for hemodialysis, perincend idialysis, or kidney transplantation. These treatments are available at only a few specially hospitals and are often cost-prohibitive.
