
Garden books offer adventure, insight

The same publisher presents A Cactus Odyssey, James D. Mauseth, Roberto Klesling, Carlos Ostolaza (\$39,93). Journey along with these well-informed authors in the wilds of Bolivia, Peru and Argentina as they travel in sometimes perilous conditions to find a particular plant. Their excitement when they make a find* is true-life adventure story of three men who are enthusiastic about their pursuit. Although this isn't a strictly practical guide to cultivating eact, they share growing tips based on an understanding of the plants mative habitats.

Mints: A Family of Herbs and Ornamentals, Barbara Perry Lawton (Timber Press, \$27,95), is the first book to survey the entire mint family (Laminecae or Labinatae).

Lawton shares fascinating history and lore, the uses of mints in health and home, as well as gardening and cooking tips.

Here you will find a surprising number of plants that you night not know are mints: Ajuga (bugleweed), Calamintha (calamint), Lavandula (lawender), Mentha (mint), Neptael (catmint), Ocimum (hasil), Origanum (oregano), Rosmarinus (rosemary), Salvia (sage), Satureja (sawoy), Teucrium (germander) and Thymus (thyme). Finding God in the Garden: Backyard Reflections on Life, Love, and Compost, Balfour Brickner (Little, Brown, \$24.96, paper), is an insightful account written after the death of a beloved daughter. As he worked in his garden, Rabbi Balfour boserved natures abundant examples of order and renewal, miracles and beauty, and he found his faith returning like a garden in spring. He finds beauty and learns the connections between biblical teachings and botanical life.

This is a book to be read slowly and with an open mind, and to share with others.

Before you do any digging for new plants, construction or any place in the garden where there is even a slight possibility of running into utility lines, call MISS DIG at (800) 482-717. They will come and mark the places to avoid. There is no charge.

Bake and remove leaves from under rose bushes to remove the breeding ground for insect pest and fungus that may harm the roses; remove fallen fruit from underneath trees to prevent over-wintering insects that could cause trouble next spring.

Shred annuals you've removed from their beds and ddd them to the compost heap.
