"Right now I'm struggling with a general disrespect of local government officials," she said. "I can't see myself as being part of an imperial establishment. I am definitely a business person. I love serving customers to the best of my ability." Still, she said, politics will always be part of her life. She enjoyed attending the Republican convention and was encouraged by the number of young people (19-22 year olds) who attended. "I liked hearing what the candidates had to say first hand," Gordanier said. "Our marching orders from them were to go back to our neighborhoods and spread the word." She'd encourage other young people to get just as deeply involved, to learn about the issues and the candidates. "You meet people, you get to know them more than just as a name on a ballot," she said. "It felt good to be informed. You felt like you actually knew what was going on. "It's good to start young," she added, "If you ever want to run for mayor or city council someday, it's good to have experience."
