No one injured in playground gun incident at Lanigan

SIMFWIRE Farmington Hills police chased down two boys, ages 6 and 13, Saturday after one of them allegedly discharged a semi-automatic pistol on the playground of Lanigan Elementary School around 4 p.m. No one was injured in the incident, said Assistant Chief Chuek Nebus. The boys, both from Fontiac, got the gun from the 6-year old's father's nightstand and also found a single bullet to load the weapon, Nebus said after interviewing the boys. Police were called by a parent of a child who was at the playground with the two boys at one time and saw the gun. This could have been the making a horrible tangedy. Nebus said. At various times the gun was pointed at the others.
