

CC whips DeLaSalle, wins division crown; Divine Child is next foe

Derrick Brooks gave his teammates a pretty good reward for his game on Saturday against Warren DeLaSalle.

By virtue of his four touchdowns, the Shamrocks were spared a long bus trip to Muskegon to play the Big Reds in a crossover game Friday.

Instead, the 35-0 win over the Pilots gave the Shamrocks an outright Central Division title and put CC in the Prep Bowl at 7 p.m. Saturday against 7-1 Dearborn Divine Child at Ford Field.

Brooks had touchdown runs of 1 and 7 yards in the first half and 5 and 16 yards in the second. The Shamrocks improved to 7-1 overall and 3-1 in the Central Division.

His first TD cupped a 10-play drive on the opening kickoff as Jason Ginnell added the first of his five extra points.

The Pilots (5-3, 1-3) drove down the field on the next drive and snuffed the end zone, but Randall Means picked off a pass to stop the drive.

The score stayed close until the last three minutes of the half. Brooks scored with 2:42 left in the half. After the Pilots

went three-and-out, CC drove 63 yards in five plays. Quarterback Dave Thomas hit Sean Shahrestani on an 8-yard TD pass with 25 seconds left.

The second half started CC's way. Pat Clarke recovered a fumble on the Pilots' 19 on the second play of the half. Three plays later, Brooks scored again from the 5.

In the fourth, Eric Vojtkovsky recovered a fumble to end one Pilot drive, then picked off a pass to end the Pilots' next drive. Six plays after that, Brooks ended the scoring on a 16-yard run.

Brooks wound up with 109 yards in 19 carries, while Vojtkovsky had 43 yards on seven carries. Thomas was 4-for-4 passing for 64 yards. In all the Shamrocks had 265 yards in total offense, while holding the Pilots to just 153.

Ryan Ash led CC with 11 tackles on defense, while Darnell Tyson added 10.

BROTHER RICE 26, ST. MARY'S 21: Brother Rice outlasted a pair of first-quarter touchdowns and St. Mary's could never catch up in this Catholic League Central Division game played Saturday evening. Junior quarterback Doug Pickens opened

the scoring on a 1-yard run, and he tossed a 25-yard scoring pass to Brian Meltzer later in the quarter.

Rice's other touchdowns were scored by Anthony Jackson (13-yard run) and Al Gloskos (14-yard run). Brian Meltzer booted all four extra points.

St. Mary's scored one touchdown in each of the last three quarters. Tony E. White threw a 25-yard scoring pass to Matt Maysal in the second quarter.

In the second half, Josh Martin scored on a 16-yard run, and Greg Olson went over from 2 yards away. Jacob Crotti kicked all three extra points.

Rice's Charlie Ryan and Meltzer had fumble recoveries while Chris Bitolli, Jackson, and Gloskos had interceptions.

The win lifted Brother Rice to 7-1 overall entering Friday's non-league game at Muskegon. St. Mary's (3-5) plays at Jackson Lunen Christi tonight.

COUNTRY DAY 25, DETROIT-JESUIT 21: Senior Kim Thompson was stellar on both sides of the ball in helping Detroit Country Day to victory over the University of Detroit Jesuit Saturday. Thompson caught a pair of touchdowns passes (23 and 56 yards) from quarterback Eric Jackson. Detenskienski he striped the ball from a U-D runner late in the third quarter and ran in for a touchdown from 16 yards out.

Junior running back Phil Demastia talked what proved to be CC's winning touchdown midway through the fourth quarter. Jackson completed seven of 17 passes for 100 yards, and Thompson finished with five interceptions for 117 yards. Junior linebacker Jugg Johnson led the defense with 14 tackles.

The Raiders have allowed just 21 legitimate points, according to Burrell. The others resulted from special teams and interception returns that gave the opposing team good field position.

"As far as teams actually driving the ball and scoring on us, we've only given up three touchdowns," Burrell said, adding the North defense hasn't allowed a point in the last three games.

"I'm pretty proud of our defensive kids, and (the Falcons) have a great defense with pretty similar stats. It should be a great high school football game."

Bechtel isn't so sure it will be a low-scoring game dominated by the defenses, however.

"Even though both have good defenses, the perception would be, if we're vulnerable, it might be through the air, which is something they're good at," he said. "If they're vulnerable, it might be the right-at-tem stuff, which we're good at."

"It's hard to say what might happen. The game could turn on one or two breaks and go one way or the other in a hurry. It's difficult to say when two teams are so evenly matched."

North quarterback Bryan Smith is a capable passer and runner with 569 and 372 yards, respectively. He has rushed for seven TDs and passed for

seven. "He can do a lot of things with the ball in his hands whether he's running with it or throwing it," Bechtel said.

"Other than that, our teams are pretty similar. Both have good special teams and play well defensively. It should be a good matchup."

A big difference for North this year is the quality of offensive and defensive linemen it has, according to Burrell.

"For the first time since I've been here, we have quality and depth at those positions," he said.

"We've always had the skill kids to make games interesting and make something happen, but it's rare when we have linemen like we have."

"Physically, I think we're a little different," Bechtel said. "I think we're a little bigger and stronger, and they're a little quicker. It should end up being an outstanding game."

Burrell is impressed by the discipline on the Farmington team and the fact the Falcons make few mistakes and cause turnovers by their defense.

Bechtel likes the way the Raiders play collectively as a team without any stars, much the way the Falcons operate, too.

"It's the team that makes the fewest mistakes that's going to win," Burrell said, adding the two kicking games are pretty equal, too.

"The defenses are real similar, so I think it will come down to which offense can move the

ball and not make mistakes."
