Ryder Cup General Chairman Bob Gagliotti at Thursday's press conference formally announcing Sutton as U.S. team captain. "We made a conscious decision several years ago to get the Ryder Cup and capping off our history."

"With that it puts us in such a select group of courses which have hosted the Ryder Cup, PGAs and U.S. Opens. Not very many courses can lay claim to that. This just adds to our history and lore - something that we felt we needed to complete."

"This is pretty prestigious. You have to realize that since 1927 when they first had the Ryder Cup, this is only the 18th time it will be played in the United States," he said. "Here we are in Michigan being able to get the Ryder Cup, and what a wonderful tribute it is to the state, Oakland Hills and Southeast Michigan."

Now it's Sutton's challenge to bring the Ryder Cup trophy back to the U.S.

The European team has won six of the last nine matches after the U.S. dominated the series' early years. In the overall 75-

year tournament history, the U.S. leads by a 24-8 margin, with a pair of ties.

But lately it's been all Europe, including the 34th Ryder Cup match last month at The Belfry in England where the host team reclaimed the trophy with a stunning 15.5-12.5 triumph.

Sutton, who said he was "overwhelmed, honored and awed" to be named captain, indicated the U.S. team needs to be more passionate about winning.

"We possess all kinds of talent in America. We've got the world's greatest player and the second-greatest player on our team," said Sutton, a member of four previous Ryder Cup teams. "I don't know what the missing ingredient is right now other than I think we can become more passionate about it."

"I think back to every time the flag is raised in every Ryder Cup ceremony I've ever been in, and every time I put my hand over my heart, it's just passion," he said. "If we can just take it to that level with every player and present that passion, I think we can come out victorious."

Oakland Hills Country Club will come out victorious. Now it's up to Sutton's Ryder Cup team to follow that lead.

"beautifully-placed" free kick, according to Russell, to tie the score. "We were hurt by our defensive size all season, and that was the case here as their final two scores were the result of long throw-ins," Russell said.

"The guys gave it their all, but they couldn't get taller for this important game," he said. "As usual, Eric White was dynamite in the midfield. He not only controlled the play when he had the ball, he also recovered possession repeatedly, effectively stifling DC's offensive attack."

"His partner in the midfield, Brett Laird, was also outstanding, working together with White to create almost every offensive opportunity we had, and there were many."

"Forward Dustin Babler worked diligently the entire game to create scoring opportunities and to come back and win balls in the midfield. White and Babler have been on the varsity all four years, and they have been keys to developing the program, on the field and off."

"Midfielder Kurtis Lovio almost put the game away on a header opportunity, but he was held back by a DC defender. Lovio was up and down the sideline for 80 minutes, creating havoc for our opponents."

"Chris Fink had yet another solid effort. All season he has put forth all of his energy and skill to help us be successful. As the stopper versus DC, he repeatedly disrupted the flow of their offense."

"We are going to greatly miss our seniors, Babler, Fink, Lovio and White. Despite the lack of experience this team had, they gave their all. It bothers me that they will not see the fruits of their efforts while they are here. But they embody everything I want this team to stand for."

"I certainly hope my underclassmen don't forget what these leaders have taught them, because it is totally invaluable. I have never seen a more selfless, dedicated group of leaders."

Russell also cited the efforts of sophomores Jason McKenzie, Chris Diehl, Ted Hideshima, Kenny Roberts, Doug Wright and Aaron Work and freshman Brad Griffin.

"I have told my team this many times this season, but I want to share it publicly," Russell said. "No group I have encountered has had more character than this group of young men."

"Through the highs and the lows, they have displayed character that many adults would envy. They always played hard, without complaints and without poor sportsmanship, regardless of the results of the contests. I am very proud of them."

The foursome of Mallory Annarino, Lennon and the Flecks won the 200 freestyle relay (1:48.22).

Farmington went 1-2-3 in the IM with Annarino placing second (5:06.58) and Christine Kennemson third (2:51.84) and the 500 freestyle in which Hand was second (5:55.11) and Lindsey Fredericks third (6:21.94). Chrissy Fleck earned second place in the 200 freestyle (2:06.58), and Laura Aldins was runner-up in diving with 134.9 points. The Falcons had other third-place swims from Amanda Mergener in the butterfly (1:15.52) and Amanda Kandt in the backstroke (1:13.91).

In a win over Royal Oak Kimball Tuesday, Annarino, Katie Fleck, Ueda and Chrissy Fleck combined to win the 400 freestyle relay with a time of 3:51.58 - a Division I state cut.

"I'm so proud of these girls," coach Jason Cavicchioli said. "It's the first time in seven years that Farmington High has qualified for the state meet!"

Cavicchioli added he was pleased with the performance of all the girls. Farmington placed 1-2-3 in the 500 freestyle, 200 IM and 500 freestyle.

Nicole Nowak won the 200 freestyle with a time of 2:27.65; Melissa Fortuna was second and Kate Roberts third.

In the IM, Tammy Cavicchioli was first with a time of 2:42.63; Ashley Starkey placed second and Allison Cova third.

In the 500 freestyle, Hand had a personal best time of 5:52.47 to take first place. Mergener was second and Roberts third.

Other individual winners were Fredericks in the backstroke (1:14.89) and Rebecca Darnbrook in the breaststroke (1:18.71). Fredericks, Darnbrook, Cavicchioli and Kandt won the medley relay with a time of 2:15.37.

NORTH WOLVES IN DIVISION: The switch to the North Activities Association might have been a good move for many of the Farmington sports teams but not the Farmington girls swim squad, according to coach Pat Duhle.

The Raiders finished 0-4 in the OAA's Division I after losing to host Birmingham Seaboard Thursday, 25-58.

Traditionally, North has had a strong program but, in Duhle's opinion, not strong enough to compete with the teams it was paired with in Division I.

Furthermore, the one meet that might have been close, a dual with Troy - was canceled when the meet official failed to appear and it couldn't be re-scheduled.

Duhle is upset there was no letter of explanation or apology from the OAA after that happened. When the division assignments were

made in late 2001, Duhle was unable to attend the OAA meeting, because the North girls team had its post-season banquet on the same night.

The Raiders finished 4-4 in dual meets - all of their wins coming outside of the division. "I'm not at all happy," Duhle said. "It's just flat out nasty to place us where they did. It's ridiculous. I think it was mean and nasty to stick us in there."

Duhle said it's difficult for swimmers to get fired up for a meet when they know what the outcome is going to be.

"I don't think I've ever seen a North Farmington swim team perform as poorly as it did tonight, and I'm not faulting the kids," he said. "The kids aren't stupid. It's not a game played with a ball and the ball can take a funny bounce. This takes a real group of people."

Duhle added the Raiders have 25 girls on their team, including the ones who are sick or hurt. The average for the other Division I teams is 40, and Duhle added many have middle school programs.

"I think this is just going to beat the stuffing out of our program," Duhle said.

"We weren't winning in the Western Lakes Activities Association, but we could bump heads with those people."

"We knew we weren't going to beat Stevenson and, with good performances, we could compete with the rest of the crew."

MERCY SWIM RESULTS: Farmington Hills Mercy suffered its first dual-meet loss of the season Thursday at Ann Arbor Pioneer, 25-56.

Mercy had second place in each relay. These Page, Elizabeth Garlow, Katie Naglick and Caitlin Kelly swam the medley (5:33.07); Caryn Swital, Carrie Rade, Kara Laniwaski and Garlow comprised the 200 freestyle team (1:41.39), and Swital, Kara Small, Naglick and Page teamed up in the 400 freestyle (3:42.73). Small also was second in the 500 freestyle (5:50.82).

Swital made a state cut in the 200 freestyle with a winning time of 2:05.55 as Mercy defeated Pontiac Notre Dame Prep Thursday, 52-64.

Garlow swam the butterfly (1:03.22) and Kara Alak won the 500 freestyle (5:41.80).

Jackie Smith anchored Mercy relay wins in the 200 freestyle (1:46.48) and the 400 freestyle (4:00.58).

Swital, Annette Merchant and Colleen Coan swam before her in the 200, and Small, Shannon Kelly and Emily Garley completed the 400 team.

Naglick, Robie, Garlepy and Sarah Schuchardt won the medley relay in 20:20.

In the Michigan Interscholastic Swim Coaches Association meet Oct. 9 at Eastern Michigan, Small was second in the 500 freestyle (5:50.35).

Naglick was fifth in the 200 freestyle (2:06.49) and Small eighth (2:54.54). Garlow was eighth in the IM (2:47.77), Caitlin Kelly seventh in the 50 freestyle (24.75), Naglick fifth in the butterfly (1:03.53) and Garlow ninth in the breaststroke (1:09.37).

In a pair of third-place swims, Swital and Caitlin Kelly combined with Robie and Garlow in the 200 freestyle relay (2:35.37) and with Kara Laniwaski and Naglick in the 400 freestyle relay (3:37.60). Smith, Garlow, Naglick and Caitlin Kelly were fourth in the medley relay (5:52.23).
