Applications are available for any person who wishes to obtain a high school diploma for a person – living or deceased – who left high school to serve in World War II. The application must include necessary documentation to verify service and eligibility. To be eligible for a diploma, veter-ans must meet all of the follow-ing criteria: The military veteran is at least age 65, if living, or had attained at least age 65, if deceased.
