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No injuries after utility pole snaps Suspect wanted in gas station robbery

The Farmington Fire Department responded to reports that a utility pole was accidentally ripped down around 11:30 a.m. Tuesday in front of the St. John Lutheran Church on Gill Road.

There were no injuries, but fire officials had a construction worker stay inside his earthmoving machine until Detroit Edison Officials could cut power to the downed lines and half of the broken utility pole that dropped to the ground. That took about an hour.

DAV Contractors were digging out a large hole for a pond in front of the church for the second day when the accident happened.

Worker Troy Assemany said the trapped worker had the machine's bucket in the air while backing up, and the bucket struck the overhead power lines, causing the pole to snap in half.

Assemany said he immediately felt the heat of the electricity and ran away after the pole snapped, taking down two transformers with it.
