formed the Michael Stark Chapter to support CLF. That was the beginning of many years of ongoing involvement with CLF. The Cornfields were a regular fixture in CLF life beginning in the mid-1960s and remained there until Sharyn completed her final term on the board in 1990.

completed for man term on the board in 1990. Alan chaired the board of directors for six years and served for many years as the board liaison with CLF's Medical Advisory Committee, which oversaw the agency's

long-standing medical

iong-standing medical research program. He also served two terms as president. The Cornfields also chiract the agency's long-running Theatre Farty fund-raisers. Alan said he was surprised by the honor because their inhouse involvement with the program ended several years ago.

In the chapter's early days, the couple helped raise money and encourage research. Years ago, children diagnosed with the disease had little hope of survival compared with today.

At the time, Alan said, a child diagnosed with the disease might die two days later. He said during their many years with the group, he and Shary witnessed a wonderful transition in leukemia treatment that offers many children a normal life after diagnosis.

"We saw how far we've come with research medications and treatment plans - things that were not possible

when we started.
"Our research people did a fine job and still are as we helped steer dollars in right directions."

As a podiatrist, his medical knowledge served well as the liaison to the medical committee for the foundation.

"We weren't just sitting hack, but keeping busy and trying to do something.

"Ninety-five percent of the people were directly related to a sick child," he said of the group. "We were fortunate with our kids."

The Cornfields' award is named for Sylvia and Harry Brown. The couple helped found CLF in 1952, with Sylvia serving as the agency's first executive director and Harry serving multiple terms as chairman of the board of directors.

"We certainly were honored," said Alan of receiving the award named after the Browns.
