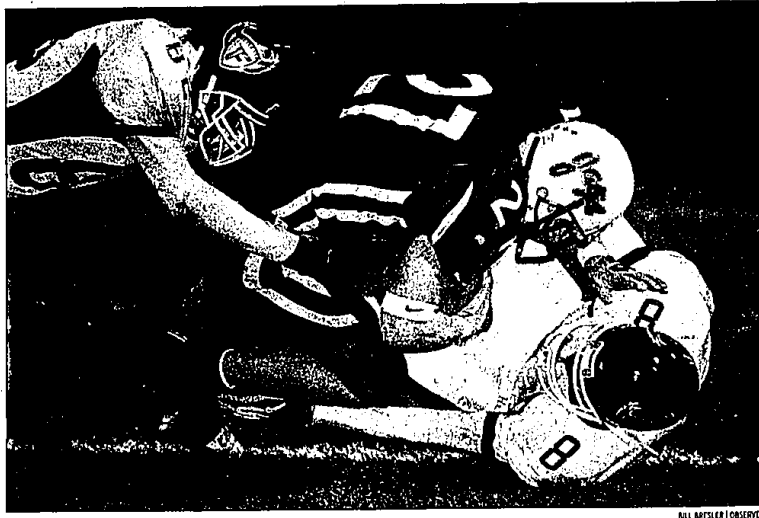

completed seven of 14 passes for 120 yards and two touchdowns.
"They controlled both sides of the line of scrimmage," Farmington coach John Bechtel said. "We thought we could push them off the football, and we were not able to do that."
"Initially, we had a little movement, but we just didn't get it done. We got behind and, as the game wore on, they wore us down. But our kids fought hard, and we're proud of them."
With the temperature near freezing at kickoff, Farmington capitalized on Martin Wilson's fumble recovery at the Allen Park 38 for its only points. The Falcons reached the 12 before settling for the field goal.
The Jaguars' Kevin Klien caught a tipped pass that was almost intercepted for a 38-yard gain to the Falcon 21.
That led to Allen Park's first TD — a 16-yard pass reception by Rob Kiefer, who then returned an interception 60 yards for another score, giving the Jaguars their 14-3 halftime lead.
"It was important that we had the lead at halftime, because it forced them to play catch-up and that's not their

game," Hoover said.
"We forced them into doing some different things, and that's why the turnovers came. The interception was big; turnovers were the difference."
The Jaguars drove 75 yards in 11 plays to start the third quarter and upped their lead to 20-3 following a 1-yard TD run by Brighton, who caught a key fourth-down pass on the previous play.
Allen Park had the ball at the Farmington 29 after a second interception, and Brighton caught a 2-yard pass from Grise for a touchdown on the final play of the third quarter.
Brighton added a 20-yard TD run, and fullback Christian Sinnott, who added 56 yards on 14 carries, scored the final TD on a 6-yard run after the Jaguars recovered a fumble at the Farmington 20.
The Jaguars outgained the Falcons, 321-147. Farmington was 0-for-4 passing. Steve Gray was Farmington's leading rusher with 52 yards on eight carries at the end of the game. Eric Halberstadt gained 35 yards on 14 attempts.
The Jaguars had 16 first downs, the Falcons five (three on the final series of the game).
"We didn't sustain anything



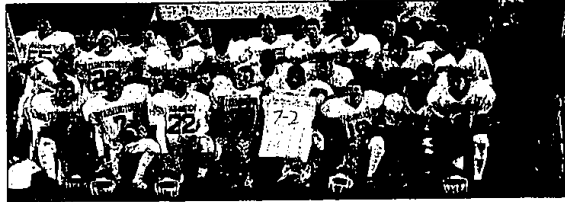
