

## Double the honor for hall of fame bowler

Harry Sullins had his moment of glory as he was inducted into two different bowling halls of fame within the space of one week.

First, he was honored by the Greater Detroit Bowling Council on Nov. 10 at its annual banquet.

On Nov. 16, he was inducted into the Budweiser Michigan Majors.

Bowling Association (MBBA) Hall of Fame during its annual banquet and ceremonies.

His Greater Detroit Hall of Fame was predicated on a high level of performance over his years both locally, nationally and internationally, as well as the Pro Bowlers Tour.

He was nicknamed "The Ironman," is based on his PBA record of 239 consecutive tournaments bowled.

Harry has been participating in the MBBA since 1979, competing in 79 tournaments, while winning three titles.

He was MBBA Bowler of the Year twice (1984 and 2001) and holds the record for most consecutive tournaments cashed (16), as well as 300 games.

Sullins made the finals 32 times, cashing in 51 tournaments with a lifetime average of 215 for 894 games.

That is outstanding.

The MBBA is an organization for the top competitors in the state to bowl for cash prizes in monthly tournaments which are spaced out throughout the southern lower peninsula of Michigan.

The MBBA stages events in Detroit area as well as out-state in such cities as Lansing, Saginaw, Bay City, Jackson and Kalamazoo.

The current president is Redford's Larry Franz. Rick Eiermann of Garden City was the banquet chairman and gave the per-dinner invocation.

Others honored were Nick Wissinger based on his outstanding performance in his 16

year career in the MBBA. Trey Edwards of Oak Park was inducted to the hall and honored for winning the 30th championship last year at Cherry Hill Lanes.

This year's championship event was dedicated to Lou Ivanek, and finally, the Bob Garrett Sportsmanship Award went to Rick Gregor.

I was welcomed along with Matt Fiorito of the Detroit Free Press for our contributions to competitive bowling with our press coverage.

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### CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS SUMMARY OF ORDINANCE

Notice of Adoption of Ordinance C-8-02, an Ordinance to amend Chapter 6, Animals, Article II, Dogs and Cats, of the City Code of the City of Farmington, Hills to amend Section 6-01 to add definitions of the terms "on a suitable leash" and "under the oral control."

A full copy of this Ordinance is on file in the Clerk's Office for public review and inspection.

THE CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS ORDAINS:

Section 1. Chapter 6, Animals, Article II, Dogs and Cats, Sec. 6-01. Definitions, of the City Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 6-01. Definitions.

The following words, terms and phrases, when used in this article, shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this section, except where the context clearly indicates a different meaning:

**On a suitable leash** means both: (1) That the dog is attached to a leash that is no more than 16 feet in length and of such material that the leash is capable of restraining, and does restrain the type and size of dog to which it is attached; and (2) That such a leash is continuously held by a person who is reasonably able to and does restrain and prohibit the dog from being out of that person's physical control. A leashed dog that chases a person or domesticated animal, a greater distance than fifty feet, or that bites a person or domesticated animal constitutes prima facie evidence that such dog is not kept on a suitable leash.

**Owner**, when applied to the proprietorship of a dog or cat, means every person having a right to property in such dog or cat, and every person who keeps or harbors such dog or cat or has it in his or her care, and every person who permits such dog or cat to remain in or about any premises occupied by such person.

**Reasonable control** means keeping a dog on a suitable leash or under the oral control of the owner or custodian in all cases other than on the owner's or custodian's private property unless the dog is confined in a closed automobile or shipping receptacle.

**Reasonable control of a cat**, recognizing the nature of this animal, requires that the owner take all reasonable efforts to ensure that the cat does not become a nuisance to any other person by a violation of or destruction to any person's private or public property.

**Under the oral control** means both: (1) That the dog is trained to and does immediately obey oral or non-verbal commands of the person in custody of the dog at the time, which oral commands effectively restrain and prevent the dog from running away, biting persons or domesticated animals, or otherwise being or acting out of the control of such person; and (2) That the dog is at all times within fifteen feet of such person. An unleashed dog that is more than fifteen feet away from the person in custody of the dog or that chases or bites a person or domesticated animal constitutes prima facie evidence that such dog is not under the oral control of the custodian or owner.
