'His' and 'her' kitchens come with reminder of homeowners' ocean adventures

There's a familiar, comfortable buzz - the sound of tumbling water - inside the spacious, quintessentially modern kitchen.

But the dishwasher is at rest, silent. And the sound is coming from elsewhere - a 10-foot high fish aquarium in the center of the kitchen.

That's right The Blumout.

That's right. The Plymouth homeowners, who wish to remain anonymous, have a fish aquarium in the kitchen.
Unquestionably the room's focal point, the salt-water tank perfectly reflects their personalities, said the room's interior designer, Eileen Jewell, owner of Studio Jewell in Royal Oak.
"They have a place in the Caribbean, and they're big scub a divers," said Jewell, a graduate of Michigan State University's Human Environment and Design program. So instead of a piece of artwork, I though how about an aquarium?"
The homeowners, having

always wanted an aquarium, embraced the idea without hesitation.

Home to three grouper and two stunning lion fish and visible from the dining room, an informal eating space and the family room, the aquarium entertains visitors and residents alike.

"It does create a lot of conversation," said one of the homeowners. "The funny thing is people talk to the fish."

The placement of the rock-filled aquarium works to visually mark off two distinct areas in the kitchen, as well.

To the right is 'her kitchen,' more expansive and equipped with all the essential appliances and a few extras, including pull-out refrigerator drawers built into a cooking island. A countertop on the opposite side of the island accommodates a set of five brushed metal stools upholstered in royal blue ultra-suede. Above the countertop is an unusual and sylistically modern chandeller in white. Both shades contrast well with the island's surface of black patterned grantused throughout the kitchen. Again, Jewell made her color selections with the homeowners in mind.

The royal blue represents them so well. They love color, she said. It also picks up the blue tones in the aquarium. Jewell strongly believes key room elements ought to reflect those who live there. "Our whole lives are spent in certain spaces.
