Kentwood has won 13 games by doing one thing well – run. OK, two things – the Falcons have scored 641 points this year, a 49.3 points-per-game average. CC's scoring average of 28.8 seems puny by comparison. "We don't do an awful lot of different things on offense, but what we do we do well, 'Shillito said. "It's all about our execution, our energy and an athletic offensive line. With the way both of us rely on the run, it might be a very short game." That's an understatement at best. In seven of its 13 games, East Kentwood has scored more than 50 points and has never scored less than 34 – including a 52-14 semifinal win over Holt. Needless to say, the Falcons have become the masters of their tight-T formation.

"They've playing some pretty

They're playing some pretty wild games, Mach said.

They're a high-scoring team. If they were winning every game 50-0, there would be more to worry about.

CC's defense has enough to worry about. Fullback Noel Aleman has rushed for 2,610 yards on 238 carries, including 254 yards against Holt. yards on 238 carries, including 254 yards against Holt.
Halfback Kyle Hinton has gained 936 yards and Eric Foster has 757 more with quarterback Cory Sanders rushing for 585 for good

measure.
"We've only thrown the ball
20 times this year, but we've
completed seven of them - six
for touchdowns," Shillito said.
"Cory can make the plays if he
needs to, but he hasn't needed
to."

This hasn't gone unnoticed by Mach.
"It's a concern," he said. "You don't want to keep coming up to stop the run and have then hit the tight end running behind everyone.
"Even though you know they're going to run, it's tough to stop. They're very efficient in what they do. As far as we know, their only offensive formation is run, and they must be mation is run, and they must be good at doing it.

"They go for it a lot on fourth down instead of punting if it's close. They'll go for two points and of kicking the extra point. It puts you in a bind." The CC defense is just as tough as the Falcons offense, giving up just 104 points on the year for an eight-point average.

points on the year for an eight-point average.

They're a tremendous defen-sive team, Shillito said. They make it very hard to run the ball.

East Kentwood's defense isn't as stingy as CC's, giving up 22.8 points a game, but with the offense's ability to put points on the board it hasn't had to be stiney.

"I think our defense gets overlooked, because we've put so many points on the board," Shillito said, "But, as the season Shinke said. But, as the season has gone on, we've gotten better and better and played with more confidence."

And the Falcons also haven't seen an offense like the

seen an offense like the Shamrocks.

"Teams have thrown against us 357 times this year, Shillito said. We've seen so many different packages, so much of a spread offense.

But CCS offense is over-looked. They don't make many mistakes and, more than anything, they move the chains. They keep the ball and are very patient. And they have some big playmakers.

There is a bit of history on CCs side. The last time the Shamrocks had a chance to wit wos traight utiles was 1997-98, defeating another Grand Angids- area school, Rockford, for the second title. "It's a lot harder going through it the second season hecause of the expectations and anticipation," Mach said. Think what is helping us is our opponents were very difficult and we never had a break.

"We've seen a wide range of offenses in these games, but the one that helped the most was Canton's because they also ran the tight." They played a great game, and I think we gained a lot of experience trying to defend it."

Garlow, who was seventh in the individual medley (2:09,91), had another strong finish in the breaststroke. She was seeded in the low teens entering the meet, and she jumped all the way to third in the finals (1:06,20). Both times were career bests.
