Raiders look for home in Division III neighborhood

The Farmington Public Schools athletic teams have moved into a new neighbor-hood this school year, and a

hood this school year, and at least one longtime area coach is looking to make a new home in the 2002-09 basketball season. After winning three of the previous four division titles in the Western Lakes Activities Association, the North Farmington Raiders roll into the Oakland Activities Association Division III this season. With a four-year start-ing player and good height at all positions, coach Tom Negoshian thinks his team can have some success in its new have some success in its new

have some success.

Its going to be a learning experience for us, he said after a recent practice. We had some great battles in the past with teams like John Glenn and the Plymouth schools. But overall, I think this was the right move for everyone.

North Farmington moves into its new digs with a number of young players after graduating well over half its roster

from a year ago, when the team finished 11-11. Leading the team on and off the court will be senior Marcus McCombs, who is projected to be a starter for the fourth straight year for the Raiders.

The 5-foot-11 shooting guard averaged 10 points and three steals per game in 2001-02, and is a co-captain of the team this year.

Joining McCombs as team leader is co-captain Matt Clark (6-0 senior), a player Negoshian calls one of the best leaders he's ever coached. Clark figures to see more court time

leaders he's ever concled. Clark figures to see more court time this seeson, with such a young lineup on the floor.

Negoshian noted he might end up starting three sophomores at times this season, though all are blessed with good size. Returning varsity player Sean Mackler (6-5) averaged six points and three rebounds as a freshman last year and will be counted on to carry a bigger load in the middle this season. Fellow sophomore Matt Leach (5-10 guard) re Matt Leach (5-10 g will run the point and is called a "heady player" by his coach. Leach saw limited varsity

action at the end of last season.

The trio of sophomores is rounded out by Darren Rawls (6-2), playing just his third year of organized basketball.

Greg Shummer (6-9 guard) and Al Kasputis (6-6 center) will lead the group off the bench and both are entering their first year on a varsity rosten. David Grant (6-2 senior), Chris Clark (6-11 Junior) and Robert White (6-0) will also bring size and balance off the bench for the Raiders. Senior Jake Fetosky comes to North after transferring from Reifford Catholic Central two years ago.

Bartley will handle the ball at the point guard, Burch said.
He's one of the team's vocal leaders and was a leader on the football team as well, a trait the

Weingert and Zakkin will form the backcourt along with Bartley in a lineup that figures to be quick and explosive offensively. Weingert is a "lender by example," according to the coach. Six. foot-9 center Robert Showalter leads a group of newcomers expected to contribute to the team right away. This is Showalter's first season on the varsily roster, and he should cause matchup prob-

lems, particularly defensively, for Harrison's opponents. A typical preseason Harrison practice in the past has been one that's long on time in the gym and short on bodies, because of the annual success of

However, this year, the carlier-than-usual end to the foot-ball season has allowed basket-

er-than-usual end to the foot-ball season has allowed basket-ball players more time on the court before the first game, which is even more valuable time this year, with a new coaching staff in place.

Burch said he'll be learning about the team's new league game-by-game, but thinks the initial mystery could be an advantage for his young squad.

"Those teams won't know what style we play, so I think we can surprise some people, he said." But it should be a lot of fun. I really enjoy teaching the game to young people, and I've been looking forward to this opportunity.

The Hawks will host the first two games of the season, the second coming Friday against Farmington, in a game sure to get players and fans jumping with both feet into basketball season.
