In the meantime, Farmington Public Schools Superintendent Bob Maxifeld wonders why more parents didn't attend the gradelevel meetings at OLS and is saking those who have been reluctant to speak up to do so now.

Some OLS parents remember Maxifeld's statement earlier this year. He said shared time would have to be supported by more than 50 percent of OLS parents.

Your standard of a vast majority of parents supporting shared time has not been met, Bergeron wrote in a Dee. 12 letter to Maxifeld. After grade-level meetings concluded in early November, Maxfield expected recommendations would be forwarded to the education committee and parents council. Those two groups would then decide whether to resubmit the shared-time proposal to the school district.

"I expect that the recommendations will include an appropriate indication concerning the level of parent support," Maxfield said.

He expected recommendations no later than early January so that the issue could go to the school board in either January or February.

# Monsignor Hurley: Most Sorrows parents back shared time

In response to a request for comment, Our Lady of Sorrows pastor Monsignor Walter Hurley offered this statement: "I am grateful to the Observer staff for sharing the most recent study regarding shared time commissioned by a parishioner. We had not previously received a copy of this study.

"During the months of September through November, Mr. Watson, the principal of Our Lady of Sorrows School, conducted a series of informational grade level meetings with parents. At these meetings, Mr. Watson shared his vision for the school including shared time.

"Parents then had the opportunity to ask questions and share their ideas.

"From a school population of 1,120 students (650 families), approximately 177 parents came with questions, concerns and support for our efforts. A total of 40 individual parents voiced opposition to shared time.
"In a carefully orchestrated meeting of

vidual parents voiced opposition to shared time.

"In a carefully orchestrated meeting of the sixth grade level, a small group came together to launch an attack that was disruptive enough to require the meeting to be terminated. Most parents were offended at the behavior of a few that contravense everything we believe and stand for.

"It is significant that an earlier study, undertaken by a law firm last spring, was never shared or discussed with the administration of OLS School or Parish. The most recent study by an accounting firm was undertaken only after the parent was undertaken only after the parent meetings indicated parental support. The accounting firm refused to identify who
